



# Clinical / Social Care Negligence Cases

in Northern Ireland (2021/22)



#### **Reader Information**

Background This statistical release summarises information collected from Health &

Social Care (HSC) Trusts, Agencies and Legacy Health and Social Services (HSS) Boards on clinical/social care negligence cases in Northern Ireland open during the year ending 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022. Information includes all cases currently open and settled, including those withdrawn or closed

with details of any monies paid.

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Statistical Quality Information detailed in this release has been quality assured with HSC

Trusts prior to release.

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### **Key Points**

#### Payments in 2021/22

- During 2021/22, £40.3 million was paid on clinical / social care negligence cases in Northern Ireland (Tables 1 & 2).
- Of the £40.3 million paid on clinical / social care negligence cases in 2021/22, over three quarters (76.2%, £30.7 million) was paid in damages, £5.9 million (14.7%) in plaintiff costs and £3.7 million (9.1%) in defence costs (Figure 1, Table 2).
- During the last five years, the amount paid on clinical / social care negligence cases increased by £4.6 million (12.9%), from £35.7 million in 2017/18 to £40.3 million in 2021/22 (Table 1).


• During 2021/22, 3,987 clinical / social care negligence cases were open at any stage, 253 (6.8%) more than in 2017/18 (3,734) (Table 3).

- In 2021/22, 523 new cases were opened, 402 cases were closed and 351 cases had been settled, whilst 3,234 cases remained open at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022 (Figure 5, Tables 4 8).
- Clinical / social care negligence cases open at any stage in 2021/22, had been open on average for 3.2 years, longer than 2020/21 (2.9 years) (Figure 11).
- Almost half (45.5%, 1,813) of all cases open in 2021/22, related to four specialties; 'Obstetrics' (564), 'Accident & Emergency' (456), 'Neurology' (407) and 'General Surgery' (386) (Table 14).
- A total of £177.4 million has been paid to date on the 3,987 clinical / social care negligence cases which were open at any stage during 2021/22. Over three quarters (78.4%, £139.0 million) had been paid in damages and £38.4 million (21.6%) paid out in legal costs (defence and plaintiff costs) (Table 15).
- Over three fifths (61.6%, £109.2 million) of the amount paid out on cases open at any stage in 2021/22 related to the 'Obstetrics' specialty, of which 82.7% (£90.4 million) had been paid in damages (Figure 19, Table 16).

# **INTRODUCTION**

The information presented in this publication is sourced from two Departmental statistical returns:

- (i) <u>CN1a</u> aggregate return that collects information on clinical/social care negligence cases including the **amount paid out each quarter**.
- (ii) <u>CN1</u> annual patient level return on clinical/social care negligence cases open at any stage during the year, including the <u>amount paid</u> (damages or legal costs) on each case since the case opened.



#### What is Clinical/Social Care Negligence?

In this statistical report, clinical/social care negligence is defined as:

"A breach of duty of care by members of the health and social care professions employed by HSC organisations or by others consequent on decisions or judgments made by members of those professions acting in the course of their employment, and which are admitted as negligent by the employer or determined as such through the legal process".

# **SECTION 1**

### **PAYMENTS MADE IN 2021/22**


This section details the amount of money paid out <u>during each year</u>, by HSC Trust / Legacy HSS Boards and payment type.

During 2021/22, £40.3 million was paid on clinical / social care negligence cases in Northern Ireland, with over three quarters (76.2%, £30.7 million) paid in damages, £5.9 million (14.7%) in plaintiff costs and £3.7 million (9.1%) in defence costs (Table 2).

During the last five years, the amount paid on clinical / social care negligence cases increased by £4.6 million (12.9%), from £35.7 million in 2017/18 to £40.3 million in 2021/22 (Table 1).

The amount paid in damages in 2021/22 increased by £4.4 million (16.5%) when compared with 2017/18, defence costs increased by £0.4 million (12.5%) whilst plaintiff costs decreased by £0.1 million (2.4%) (Figure 1).



Over a quarter (26.3%, £10.6 million) of all monies paid in 2021/22 were paid by the Western HSC Trust, whilst the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service (NIAS) and the Northern Ireland Blood Transfusion Service (NIBTS) paid the lowest amount (0.1%, £33,442) (Figure 2, Table 2).

During 2021/22, the percentage of all monies paid in legal costs <sup>1</sup> ranged from 12.4% (£1.3 million) of cases in the Western HSC Trust to 88.0% (£29,442) of cases in the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service (NIAS) and the Northern Ireland Blood Transfusion Service (NIBTS) (Figure 2, Table 2).

# **SECTION 2**

### CASES OPEN AT ANY STAGE DURING THE YEAR

This section details the number of clinical/social care negligence cases open at any stage during each of the last five years. Readers should note that once a case is opened it will be included for each year that it remains open or settled. The year in which a case is closed is the last year it will be included.


Figure 3: Cases open at any stage, by HSC Trust / Legacy HSS Boards (2017/18-2021/22)

During 2021/22, 3,987 clinical / social care negligence cases were open at any stage, 253 (6.8%) more than 2017/18 (3,734) (Figure 3, Table 3).

Trust / Legacy HSS Board (2017/18–2021/22)




Since 2017/18, the NIAS and NIBTS reported the largest percentage increase in the number of cases open (61.1%, 11 cases), from 18 to 29 in 2021/22 (Figure 4, Table 3).

Over the last five years, the number of open cases increased in the Belfast HSC Trust, Northern HSC Trusts, Legacy Eastern HSS Board, Legacy Southern HSS board, and the NIAS/NIBTS (Figure 4, Table 3).

Over four fifths (81.1%, 3,234) of the 3,987 cases open at any stage in 2021/22 remained open at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022, 351 (8.8%) had been settled and 402 (10.1%) had been closed (Figure 5, Table 4).

Over two fifths (43.4%, 1,730) of all cases open at any stage during 2021/22 were in the Belfast HSC Trust, 546 (13.7%) in the Southern Eastern HSC Trust, 539 (13.5%) in the Western HSC Trust, 519 (13.0%) in the Southern HSC Trust, 516 (12.9%) in the Northern HSC Trust, 108 (2.7%) in the Legacy HSS Boards and 29 (0.7%) in the NIAS / NIBTS (Table 4).

#### **Open cases**

An open case refers to any case for which an official letter of notification of the intention to proceed with a case has been received, and which had not been settled or closed by the last day of the year (31st March).

At 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022, 3,234 cases remained open in Northern Ireland. Across HSC Trusts, the number of cases open ranged from 108 in the Legacy HSS Boards, NIAS & NIBTS to 1,490 in the Belfast HSC Trust (Figure 6, Table 5).

Since 2018, the Belfast HSC Trust reported the largest increase in the number of cases open at 31<sup>st</sup> March (310, 26.3%), from 1,180 to 1,490 in 2022 (Figure 6, Table 5).

#### Settled cases 5

A settled case refers to any settled case that was not subsequently closed by the end of 2021/22. If a case was settled and then closed within the same financial year it is recorded as closed as at 31<sup>st</sup> March.

During 2021/22, 351 cases were settled in Northern Ireland. Of these, 157 (44.7%) were settled in the Belfast HSC Trust, 51 (14.5%) in the Southern HSC Trust, 47 (13.4%) in the South Eastern HSC Trust, 43 (12.3%) in the Western HSC Trust, 35 (10.0%) in the Northern HSC Trust, and 18 (5.1%) in the Legacy HSS Boards, NIAS & NIBTS (Figure 7, Table 6).

Since 2017/18, the number of cases settled increased in each HSC Trust with the exception of the Northern HSC Trust. The Southern HSC Trust reported the largest increase (32, 168.4%) in the number of cases settled during this period, from 19 to 51 in 2021/22 (Figure 7, Table 6).

#### **Closed cases**

#### A closed case refers to:

- (i) a case where the decision has been made to withdraw or not proceed with no money being awarded; or
- (ii) a case where all monies awarded have been paid, and there is no longer any activity.

A case is officially closed when the Directorate of Legal Services (DLS) issue a letter stating that the case has been closed.

During 2021/22, 402 cases were closed in Northern Ireland. Of these, 106 (26.4%) were closed in the Northern HSC Trust, 86 (21.4%) in the South Eastern HSC Trust, 83 cases (20.6%) in the Belfast HSC Trust, 62 (15.4%) in the Southern HSC Trust, 54 (13.4%) in the Western HSC Trust and 11 (2.7%) in the Legacy HSS Boards, NIAS & NIBTS (Figure 8, Table 7).

#### **New cases**


A new case refers to any case opened during the financial year i.e. 1<sup>st</sup> April 2021 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022.

During 2021/22, 523 new cases were opened in Northern Ireland, with the number of new cases opened ranging from 14 in the Legacy HSS Boards, NIAS & NIBTS to 230 in the Belfast HSC Trust (Figure 9, Table 8).

Since 2017/18, the number of new cases opened decreased in all Trusts with the exception of the Legacy HSS Boards, NIAS & NIBT which remained at 14 cases (Figure 9, Table 8).

#### **Year of incident**

The information below presents the number of clinical / social care negligence cases that were open at any stage during 2021/22, by the year in which the alleged incident occurred.

Information on the date of the alleged incident was recorded for 98.1% (3,911) of all cases open in  $2021/22^6$  (Table 9).


It should also be noted that cases may not be lodged until several years after the date of the alleged incident. This would be expected in cases such as those relating to pregnancy and childbirth, where there may be a delay in the outcome of the disease or disorder.

Almost a third (31.0%, 1,212) <sup>7</sup> of all cases open at any stage in 2021/22 related to incidents within the last five years, whilst 130 (3.3%) related to incidents prior to 1993 (Figure 10, Table 9).

#### Age of case

The age of a case is based on the difference between the date the case was opened and 31st March 2022 or the date the case was settled or closed.


Over half (50.2%, 1,622) of the 3,234 cases that remained open at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022, had been open for less than 3 years, whilst 134 (4.1%) had been open for 10 years or more (Table 10).

Over two thirds (67.2%, 236) of cases settled in 2021/22 had been open for 3 - 10 years, whilst 101 (28.8%) were open for less than three years (Table 10).

Almost three quarters (74.1%, 298) of cases closed during 2021/22 had been open for less than 5 years (Table 10).

Cases open at any stage in 2021/22, had been open on average for 3.2 years, longer than in 2020/21 (2.9 years) (Figure 11).

#### Age at date of alleged incident 8


Age, at the time of the alleged incident, was available for 3,845 (96.4%) clinical / social care negligence cases open at any stage during 2021/22. On a few occasions the relevant HSC Trust/Legacy HSS Board may not initially have been informed of the date of the alleged incident or the date of birth of the patient, in these instances, age at the date of the alleged incident is unknown (Figure 12).

Over the last five years, the number of cases open increased in each age group with the exception of the '0-1' and '19-34' year old age groups, with the highest number of cases open (1,042) recorded in the '35-50' age group (Table 11).

Since 2017/18, the number of cases involving persons '18 & under', increased by 5 (0.7%), from 758 in 2017/18 to 763 in 2021/22 (Table 11).

Since 2017/18, the number of cases involving persons in the 'Over 65' age group increased by 36 (9.6%), from 375 to 411 in 2021/22 (Table 11).

#### Nature of alleged incident


The nature of the alleged incident was recorded for 3,615 (90.7%) of all cases open at any stage during 2021/22 <sup>9</sup> (Table 12).

Four nature of incident categories accounted for two thirds (66.5%, 2,651) <sup>10</sup> of all cases open at any stage during 2021/22, 1,166 (29.2%) cases related to 'Treatment', 920 (23.1%) to 'Diagnosis & Tests', 366 (9.2%) to 'Pregnancy & Childbirth' and 199 (5.0%) to 'Level of Care/ Supervision/ Follow-up' (Figure 13, Table 12).

In 2021/22, the highest number of cases related to 'Treatment' in three of the five HSC Trusts (Belfast, South Eastern and Western), whilst the highest number of cases in the Northern and Southern HSC Trusts related to 'Diagnosis & Tests' (110 and 135 respectively) (Table 23).

The largest percentage of cases open in the Legacy HSS Boards, NIAS & NIBTS in 2021/22, related to the 'Pregnancy & Childbirth' incident group (13.9%, 19) (Table 23).

Of the 1,166 cases related to the 'Treatment' incident group, 74.3% (866) were associated with 'Fail to / Delay Treatment' (Figure 14, Table 13).


Over three fifths (63.0%, 580) of the 920 cases as 'Diagnosis & Tests' related to 'Failure to / Delay diagnosis' (Figure 14, Table 13).

Of the 366 cases related to 'Pregnancy & Childbirth', 44.5% (163) related to 'Birth Defects' and 148 (40.4%) related to 'Pregnancy / Childbirth' (Figure 14, Table 13).

Over a quarter (25.8%, 49) of incidents reported as 'Operation' (190) related to 'Operator Error' (Figure 14, Table 13).

More than a quarter (25.6%, 51) of cases reported as 'Level of Care/Supervision/Follow-up' (199), related to 'Fail to supervise' (Figure 14, Table 13).

#### Specialty 11

Specialty was recorded for 3,827 (96.0%) of all clinical / social care negligence cases open at any stage during 2021/22 (Table 14).


Since 2017/18, the number of cases relating to the 'Neurology' specialty has increased almost twenty-fold (384), from 23 to 407 in 2021/22 (Table 14).

Almost half (45.5%, 1,813) of all cases open in 2021/22, related to four specialties; 'Obstetrics' (564), 'Accident & Emergency' (456), 'Neurology' (407) and 'General Surgery' (386) (Figure 15, Table 14).


### **PAYMENTS UP TO 31st MARCH 2022**

Readers should note that information presented in this section <u>refers to the</u> <u>total cumulative payments up to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022</u> and <u>not</u> the amount paid out in 2021/22, which is presented separately in section 1. For example, if a case was opened in 2015 and had not been closed by 1<sup>st</sup> April 2021, payments will be included on this case from the date it opened until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022 or closed date.

At 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022, £177.4 million had been paid on the 3,987 clinical / social care negligence cases that were open at any stage in 2021/22. Of this, £139.0 million (78.4%) had been awarded in damages, £25.0 million (14.1%) in plaintiff costs and £13.4 million (7.6%) in defence costs (Figure 16, Table 15).

Four fifths (80.0%, £111.2 million) of the total amount paid in damages <sup>12</sup> related to just 46 (1.2%) of the 3,987 cases open during 2021/22.

Figure 16: Amount paid on cases open at any stage during 2021/22



The Belfast HSC Trust paid the largest amount in damages and legal costs (£56.2 million) on cases which were open in 2021/22, accounting for almost one third (31.7%) of all monies paid (Figure 17, Table 15).


Almost two fifths (£14.6 million, 38.0%) of the total amount paid in legal costs  $^{13}$  was paid by the Belfast HSC Trust, £7.0 million (18.3%) by the South Eastern HSC Trust, £6.0 million (15.7%) by the Southern HSC Trust, £5.6 million (14.5%) by the Northern HSC Trust, £3.0 million (7.8%) by the Western HSC Trust, £2.1 million (5.5%) by the Legacy HSS Boards and £34,104 (0.1%) by the NIAS/NIBTS (Table 15).

#### Payments by specialty


Of the £177.4 million paid on clinical / social care negligence cases open at any stage during 2021/22, £161.9 million (91.2%), related to 10 specialties (Table 16, Figure 18).

Over three fifths (61.6%, £109.2 million) of the amount paid out on cases open at any stage in 2021/22 related to the 'Obstetrics' specialty, of which 82.7% (£90.4 million) had been paid in damages (Figure 19, Table 16).

Figure 19: Amount paid on the obstetrics specialty (2021/22)





Over two fifths (40.8%, £72.4 million) of the total amount paid to date on clinical / social care negligence cases open at any stage during 2021/22, related to the Pregnancy & Childbirth nature of incident group. Of this, 82.9% (£60.0 million) had been paid in damages (Figure 20, Table 17).

Four categories accounted for 87.5% (£155.3 million) of all monies paid on cases open at any stage during 2021/22. Of this, £123 million (79.2%) had been paid in damages and £32.3 million (20.8%) in legal costs (Table 17).

#### Periodical payment orders

A periodical payment order (PPO), also referred to as a 'structured settlement', is an arrangement whereby the claimant receives a lump sum for their immediate needs up front, followed by periodical payments on an agreed schedule, that is, it provides a stream of future payments (tax-free) guaranteed for life. The decision on whether to proceed with receiving the settlement as a lump sum or through periodical payments is voluntary, and to date a relatively small number of plaintiffs have opted for PPOs in Northern Ireland.

Almost a quarter (24.6%, £43.7 million) of the £177.4 million paid on cases open at any stage during 2021/22, had been paid on 17 PPO cases (Figure 21, Table 18).


Of the £43.7 million paid by PPOs, £36.1 million (82.7%) had been paid in damages, £5.3 million (12.2%) in plaintiff costs and £2.2 million (5.1%) in defence costs (Table 18).

Over three fifths (60.5%, £26.5 million) of the amount paid by PPOs had been paid by the South Eastern HSC Trust, and £17.2 million (39.5%) by the Southern HSC Trust, whilst the Belfast, Northern and Western HSC Trusts and the Legacy HSS Boards, NIAS & NIBTS had no PPOs in 2021/22 (Table 18).

#### Payments on closed cases 15

During 2021/22, 402 (10.1%) cases were closed, with over three quarters (77.1%, 310) closed without any payment awarded (Table 19).

The Belfast HSC Trust closed 83 cases in 2021/2022, with 72 (86.7%) being closed without any payments awarded, whilst the Northern HSC Trust made payments on almost one third (30.2%, 32) of the cases they closed in 2021/22 (Figure 22, Table 19).

Over one fifth (22.9%, 92) of cases closed in 2021/22 had payments awarded, which totalled £4.7 million. This accounted for 2.7% of all monies paid out on cases open at any stage during the year (Table 20).

Almost half (49.4%, £2.3 million) of the amount paid on cases closed in 2021/22 was paid by the Northern HSC Trust (Table 20).

#### Closed cases with legal costs exceeding damages

Over one in ten (13.4%, 54) cases closed in 2021/22 had legal costs (£1.2 million) exceeding the amount awarded in damages (£0.6 million). This equates to £0.6 million more paid in legal costs than damages, with the Southern Trust recording the largest difference (£0.2 million) (Table 21).

#### Payments on cases closed with no damages

Twenty four (6.0%) cases closed in 2021/22 had no damages awarded but had legal fees amounting to £170,283. This accounted for 3.6% of all monies paid out on cases closed during 2021/22 (Table 22).

# **APPENDIX 1: TECHNICAL NOTES**

This statistical release presents information on clinical/social care negligence cases open in Northern Ireland during the year ending 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022. Information was provided by all Health & Social Care (HSC) Trusts including the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service (NIAS), the Northern Ireland Blood Transfusion Service (NIBTS), Legacy HSS Boards and Agencies.

#### **Data Collection**

The information presented within this release is based on the quarterly CN1a and annual CN1 statistical returns. The CN1 statistical return was the first of two statistical returns introduced in June 2010 to monitor clinical/social care negligence cases in Northern Ireland. The CN1 return collects information on each case of clinical/social care negligence open during the year (1st April – 31st March). It details information on: the type of case, gender of patient, patient postcode, date of incident, date of case, date settled, date closed, specialty to which case is associated, nature of the incident, legal stage, outcome of the case, amount paid in damages, defence and plaintiff costs, date of birth and date of death if appropriate.

If no clinical/social care negligence cases were open at any time during the year, including those which were subsequently withdrawn or closed without payment of compensation against the HSC Trust, Legacy HSS Board or Agency, a nil return was submitted. For the 2021/22 CN1 return, a nil return was submitted by the Northern Ireland Guardian Ad Litem Agency (NIGALA).

The second of these statistical returns on clinical/social care negligence (CN1a) is collected on a quarterly basis and presents a summary of activity during each quarter. It details the number of cases open on the last day of the quarter, new cases opened, cases closed and financial payments made during the quarter.

Data providers are supplied with technical guidance documents outlining the methodologies that should be used in the collection, reporting and validation of each of these data returns. These documents can be accessed at the following link:

Rounding

Percentages and financial information have been rounded to one decimal place and as a consequence these may not sum to the totals.

**Data Quality** 

The data featured in this release have been provided by HSC Trusts, Legacy HSS Boards and Agency information staff and have been validated by Hospital Information Branch (HIB) prior to release. HIB carried out a detailed series of validations to verify that information was consistent both within and across returns. Queries arising from validation checks were returned for clarification and if required returns were amended and/or resubmitted.

It is important to note that some cases will have been settled and/or closed since 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022 and these will be accounted for in the next publication, for 2022/23.

**Main Uses of Data** 

The main uses of these data are to monitor and report the details of

alleged clinical/social care negligence cases open at any stage during the

year, for corporate monitoring, to inform and monitor related policy, and

to respond to assembly questions and ad-hoc queries from the public.

# **APPENDIX 2: DEFINITIONS**

# 1. Clinical/social care negligence:

For the purposes of this information collection, Clinical/Social Care Negligence is defined as:

"A breach of duty of care by members of the health care and social professions employed by HSC organisations or by others consequent on decisions or judgments made by members of those professions acting in the course of their employment, and which are admitted as negligent by the employer or determined as such through the legal process".

#### 2. Cases open

This refers to the total number of cases open on the last day of the financial year. An open case refers to all cases to which an official letter of notification of the intention to proceed with a case has been received and which had not been settled or closed by the last day of the year.

#### 3. Cases settled

A settled case refers to any case settled that was not subsequently closed by the end of 2021/22. These cases may not be closed until the following year.

#### 4. Cases closed during year

Cases closed during the year refers to the number of cases where the decision has been made to withdraw or not proceed with no money being awarded. It should also include cases where all monies awarded have been paid, and there is no longer any activity. A case is officially closed when DLS (Directorate of Legal Services) issue a letter that the case file has been closed.

#### 5. New cases opened

This refers to any cases that were opened between 1<sup>st</sup> April 2021 and 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022.

#### 6. Outcome unknown

Outcome unknown refers to cases where the outcome of the case was not recorded or there was no settled or closed date recorded.

# 7. Financial payments

Details the total amount paid during the quarter on: damages, plaintiff and defence costs.

# 8. Damages

Damages will include only costs associated with the case for damages and will exclude all costs associated with the Plaintiff and/or the Defence.

## 9. Defence costs

Defence costs should include the total of any Expert Reports, Costs of Junior Counsel, Senior Counsel, Loss Adjusters, Case Investigators, and any other defence costs.

#### 10. Plaintiff costs

Plaintiff costs should include the Costs of Compensation Recovery Unit (CRU), Receipts, and any Third Party costs.
