





Northern Ireland Waiting Time Statistics:

Outpatient Waiting Times
Quarter Ending September 2016



Reader Information

Purpose:

This statistical release presents information on waiting times for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment in Northern Ireland and reports on the performance of the Health and Social Care (HSC) Trusts against the 2016/17 Ministerial waiting time target which states that:

"By March 2017, 50% of patients should wait no longer than 9 weeks for a first outpatient appointment; with no patient waiting longer than 52 weeks."

This statistical release details information on the number of patients waiting, and length of time waiting, for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment in HSC Trusts at 30th June 2016. It also includes activity for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment commissioned by the Health Service during the guarter ending June 2016. Data are presented by HSC Trust, specialty and time band. Information on Integrated Clinical Assessment and Treatment Services (ICATS) waiting times are available in the accompanying CSV file.

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

Total number of patients waiting at 30th September 2016



At 30th September 2016, a total of 243,141 patients were waiting for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment, 7.8% (17,548) more than at 30th June 2016 (225,593) and 5.4% (12,516) more than at 30th September 2015 (230,625) (Table 1).




Almost two fifths (38.8%) were waiting for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment in the Belfast HSC Trust, with a further 20.8% in the South Eastern HSC Trust, 16.2% in the Southern HSC Trust, 12.4% in the Western HSC Trust and 11.9% in the Northern HSC Trust (Table 2a).

Nearly two thirds (63.3%, 153,965) of the 243,141 patients were waiting for a first outpatient appointment in one of the following specialties: Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery (31,147); Ear, Nose and Throat (30,221); General Surgery (29,779); Ophthalmology (21,792); Gynaecology (15,791); General Medicine (13,128) and Neurology (12,107) (Table 3a).

Patients waiting more than 9 weeks at 30th September 2016



Achievement of the 9 week target requires that less than 50% of patients should be waiting over 9 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment.

Over two thirds (68.8%,167,250) of patients were waiting more than 9 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment at 30th September 2016, compared with 64.8% (146,167) at 30th June 2016 and 67.0% (154,591) at 30th September 2015 (Table 1).

At 30th September 2016, the 9 week element of the target was not achieved by Northern Ireland as a whole or by any individual HSC Trust (Table 2a).

Just over two-thirds (66.9%, 111,843) of the 167.250 patients waiting more than 9 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment at 30th September 2016 were in one of the following specialties: Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery; Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT); General Surgery; Ophthalmology, General Medicine; Neurology and Urology (Table 3a).

Patients waiting more than 52 weeks at 30th September 2016





At 30th September 2016, 16.3% (39,557) of patients were waiting more than 52 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment, compared with 13.4% (30,170) at 30th June 2016, and 9.0% (20,840) at 30th September 2015 (Table 1).

At 30th September 2016, the 52 week element of the target was not achieved by Northern Ireland as a whole or by any individual HSC Trust (Table 2a).

Almost a quarter (24.3%, 22,939) of patients in the Belfast HSC Trust were waiting longer than 52 weeks at 30th September 2016, 16.0% (4,817) in the Western HSC Trust, 11.9% (6,019) in the South Eastern HSC Trust, 9.7% (3,827) in the Southern HSC Trust and 6.8% (1,955) in the Northern HSC Trust (Table 2a).

A total of 86.4% (34,160) of the 39,557 patients waiting more than 52 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment were in one the following specialties: Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery; Urology; Ophthalmology; General Medicine; Neurology; General Surgery and Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT) (Table 3a).

Completed waits for a first outpatient appointment commissioned by the Health Service during quarter ending September 2016



During the quarter ending September 2016, there were 113,374 attendances for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment in Health Service hospitals in Northern Ireland, 10.8% (13,708) less than during the quarter ending June 2016 (127,082), and 2.8% (3,285) less than during the quarter ending September 2015 (116,659) (Table 4).



During the quarter ending September 2016, 560 Health Service patients attended a first outpatient appointment within the Independent Sector. This is a 50.7% decrease on the quarter ending June 2016 (1,137) but more than double on the same quarter last year (248) (Table 4).

When the number of attendances commissioned by the Health Service, within the Independent Sector, during the quarter ending September 2016 (560) is combined with that for outpatients attending a first outpatient appointment in Health Service hospitals during the same period (113,374), the total number of outpatients who attended a first appointment in Northern Ireland for an assessment commissioned by the Health Service was 113,934 (Table 4). This is a decrease of 11.1% (14,285) on the number seen during the quarter ending June 2016 (128,219), and 2.5% less (2,973) than during the quarter ending September 2015 (116,907).

Appendix 2: Explanatory Notes

- The sources for the data contained in this release are the DoH CH3, QOAR and IS1 Part 1
 Returns. These returns collect information from Health and Social Care Trusts on a quarterly
 basis.
- The 'Outpatient Waiting Times Publication Supporting Documentation' booklet details the
 technical guidance, definitions, as well as notes on how to use the data contained within this

- 3. All of the data contained in the tables are available on a quarterly basis and can be supplied by individual specialty or Provider HSC Trust if this level of detail is required. In addition, quarterly data relating to waiting times for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment have been published in spreadsheet format (CSV), split by HSC Trust, Specialty and Programme of Care, in order to aid secondary analysis. - 4. Information includes patients living outside Northern Ireland and privately funded patients waiting for treatment in Health Service hospitals in Northern Ireland.
- 5. Outpatient waiters are defined as patients still waiting for their first outpatient appointment at the end of the quarter, including those who have cancelled or missed a previous appointment. An outpatient appointment is to enable a patient to see a consultant, a member of their team or locum for such a member, in respect of one referral. Waiting time for a first outpatient appointment begins on the date the HSC Trust receives a referral for a first outpatient appointment and ends on the date a patient attends a first outpatient appointment. Patients who cannot attend (CNA) have their waiting time adjusted to commence on the date they informed the HSC Trust they could not attend, while patients who do not attend (DNA) have their waiting time adjusted to commence on the date of their DNA.
- 6. From 1st April 2014, Oral Surgery services undertaken by consultants contracted to the South Eastern HSC Trust were centralized, meaning that records for patients waiting for this service in both the Northern and Southern HSC Trusts are now held and managed in the South Eastern HSC Trust. A breakdown of the waiting times for these patients broken down by HSC Trust has been provided in the spreadsheet located at https://www.health-ni.gov.uk/articles/outpatient-waiting-times

- 7. Each outpatient waiting time band relates to the number of completed weeks a patient has been waiting for outpatient assessment. For example, a patient waiting exactly 6 weeks would be included in the 0-6 week time band and a patient waiting 6 weeks and 1 day would be included in the >6-9 (greater than 6 weeks but waiting no longer than 9 weeks) time band.
- 8. The Ministerial target, for outpatient waiting times, as set out in the Health and Social Care (Commissioning Plan) Direction states that by March 2017, 50% of patients should wait no longer than nine weeks for a first outpatient appointment, with no patient waiting longer than 52 weeks.
- The total number of completed outpatient waits each quarter, within HSC hospitals, is derived as
 the total number of attendances at a first outpatient appointment from the Departmental Quarterly
 Outpatient Activity Return (QOAR).
- 10. The number of patients that received an outpatient assessment, commissioned by the Health Service, in the Independent Sector is collected on the IS1 Part 1. These figures are provided by the HSC Board. They are published for each transferring Health and Social Care Trust (Trust responsible for the patient's waiting time). They are not National Statistics and they have not been validated by the Department; however, they have been included to provide users with a comprehensive view of completed outpatient waits during each quarter.
- 11. HIB surveyed data providers during 2011/12 to ascertain the cost of producing, validating and submitting the information required for this publication. This relates to the time taken to generate, validate and submit data, over and above what is already required by their organisation for internal performance management purposes. The cost to data providers of compliance within HIB's requirements for this publication, based on HSC salary costs, was £3,110.
- 12. Figures relating to outpatient waiting times for the quarter ending 31st December 2016 will be released on Thursday 23rd February 2017.
