





Northern Ireland Waiting Time Statistics:

Inpatient and Day Case Waiting Times

Quarter Ending March 2017



Reader Information

Purpose:

This statistical release presents information on waiting times for admission for either inpatient or day case treatment in Northern Ireland and reports on the performance of the Health and Social Care (HSC) Trusts against the <u>2016/17 Ministerial waiting time target</u> which states that:

"By March 2017, 55% of patients should wait no longer than 13 weeks for inpatient/day case treatment, with no patient waiting longer than 52 weeks."

This statistical release details information on the number of patients waiting, and length of time waiting, for inpatient and day case admissions in HSC Trusts at 31st March 2017. Data are presented by HSC Trust, specialty and time band. It also includes inpatient and day case activity commissioned by the Health Service during the quarter ending March 2017.

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
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By March 2017, 55% of patients should wait no longer than 13 weeks for inpatient/day case treatment, with no patient waiting longer than 52 weeks.

At 31st March 2017, a total of 71,483 patients were waiting to be admitted to hospitals, 1.0% (701) more than at 31st December 2016 (70,782), and 5.3% (3,585) more than at 31st March 2016 (67,898) (Table 1).

Almost one third (32.4%, 23,168) of those waiting for admission at 31st March 2017 were waiting for an inpatient admission, with the remaining 67.6% (48,315) waiting for a day case admission (Table 1).



A number of inpatient and day case services may not be provided at a patient's local HSC Trust, and instead are provided at a single regional centre for Northern Ireland. As patients are reported against the HSC Trust responsible for the service that will be providing treatment, users should be cautious in how they use these data (see explanatory note 11).

Over two fifths (41.5%) were waiting to be admitted in the Belfast HSC Trust, with a further 21.5% waiting in the Western HSC Trust, 15.1% in the Southern HSC Trust, 12.1% in the South Eastern HSC Trust and 9.8% in the Northern HSC Trust (Table 2a).


Over three quarters (78.1%, 55,793) of the 71,483 patients were waiting for admission in one of the following specialties: General Surgery (13,533); Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery (13,299); Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT) (6,839); Ophthalmology (6,511); Urology (6,469) Gynaecology (5,483) and Gastroenterology (3,659) (Table 3a).


Achievement of the 13 week target requires that less than 45% of patients should be waiting over 13 weeks for inpatient or day case admission.

At 31st March 2017, 56.0% (40,037) of patients were waiting more than 13 weeks to be admitted for treatment, compared with 55.3% (39,123) at 31st December 2016 and 48.1% (32,676) at 31st March 2016 (Table 1).

At 31st March 2017, the 13 week element of the target was not achieved by Northern Ireland as a whole (Table 2a). The Northern HSC Trust did meet this element of the target, however, data users should be aware that many inpatient and day case services are not provided at every HSC Trust (see explanatory note 11).

Over two thirds (72.8%, 16,859) of those patients waiting for an inpatient admission, were waiting over 13 weeks. This is compared with 48.0% (23,178) waiting over 13 weeks for a day case admission (Table 1).

At 31st March 2017, 13.5% (9,615) of patients were waiting more than 52 weeks for either an inpatient or day case admission, compared with 12.0% (8,470) at 31st December 2016, and 8.8% (5,961) at 31st March 2016 (Table 1).

At 31st March 2017, the 52 week element of the target was not achieved by Northern Ireland as a whole or by any individual HSC Trust (Table 2a). Data users should be aware that many inpatient and day case services are not provided at every HSC Trust (see explanatory note 11).

Almost a fifth (19.7%, 3,022) of patients in the Western HSC Trust were waiting longer than 52 weeks at 31st March 2017, 15.2% (4,505) in the Belfast HSC Trust, 11.1% (959) in the South Eastern HSC Trust, 9.5% (1,028) in the Southern HSC Trust, and 1.4% (101) in the Northern HSC Trust (Table 2a).

Of those waiting more than 52 weeks, 5,270 were waiting for an inpatient admission and 4,345 were waiting for a day case admission (Table 1).

A total of 93.7% (9,010) of the 9,615 patients waiting more than 52 weeks to be admitted were in one of the following specialties: Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery; General Surgery; Ear, Nose and **Throat** (ENT); Urology; Gynaecology; Pain Management **Plastic** and Surgery (Table 3a).



Although the number of patients waiting for inpatient and day case admission increased between the 31st December 2016 and 31st March 2017, a total of 44,660 patients were admitted to Health Service hospitals in Northern Ireland during the quarter ending March 2017, 2.7% (1,220) less than during the quarter ending December 2016 (45,880), but 1.2% (551) more than during the quarter ending March 2016 (44,109) (Table 4).

During the quarter ending March 2017, 3,718 patients received inpatient or day case treatment commissioned by the Health Service, within the Independent Sector, 44.3% (1,142) more than the quarter ending December 2016 (2,576), but 23.9% (1,165) less than the same quarter in the previous year (4,883) (Table 4).

When the number completed inpatient and day case waits within the Independent Sector during the quarter ending March 2017 (3,718) is combined with those treated in Health Service hospitals during the same period (44,660),figures provisional indicate that 48,378 inpatients and day cases received treatment in Northern Ireland commissioned by the Health Service. This was

a 0.2% (78) decrease in the number of completed waits commissioned by the Health Service between the quarter ending December 2016 (48,456) and the quarter ending March 2017 (48,378) and a decrease of 1.3% (614) compared to quarter ending March 2016 (48,992) (Table 4).

Appendix 2: Explanatory Notes

- 1. The sources for the data contained in this release are the DoH Inpatient Waiting Times Dataset, Hospital Inpatient System and IS1 Part 2 Return. These returns collect information from Health and Social Care Trusts on a quarterly basis.
- 2. The 'Inpatient and Day Case Waiting Times Publication Supporting Documentation' booklet details the technical guidance, definitions, as well as notes on how to use the data contained within this statistical release. This booklet is available to view or download from the following link: https://www.health-ni.gov.uk/publications/northern-ireland-waiting-time-statistics-inpatient-waiting-times-march-2017.
- 3. All of the data contained in the tables are available on a quarterly basis and can be supplied by individual specialty or Provider HSC Trust if this level of detail is required. In addition, quarterly data relating to inpatient and day case waiting times have been published in spreadsheet format (CSV), split by HSC Trust, Specialty, Programme of Care and Intended Management of the patient (i.e. Inpatient Admission or Day Case), in order to aid secondary analysis. These data are available at https://www.health-ni.gov.uk/articles/inpatient-waiting-times.
- 4. Information includes patients living outside Northern Ireland and privately funded patients waiting for treatment in Health Service hospitals in Northern Ireland.
- 5. Inpatient and day case waiting list data comprise the number of patients waiting for inpatient admission to hospital and the number of patients waiting for day case treatment.
- 6. Inpatient admissions can include both (a) patients admitted electively with the expectation that they will remain in hospital for at least one night, and (b) non-elective admissions (e.g. emergency admissions). A patient who is admitted with either of the above intentions, but who leaves hospital for any reason without staying overnight, is still counted as an inpatient admission.
- 7. Day Cases are patients admitted electively during the course of a day with the intention of receiving care who do not require the use of a hospital bed overnight and who return home as scheduled. If this original intention is not fulfilled and the patient stays overnight, such a patient is counted as an inpatient admission.

- 8. The inpatient and day case waiting list figures do not include:
 - -Patients admitted as emergency cases;
 - -Outpatients;
 - -Patients undergoing a planned programme of treatment e.g. a series of admissions for chemotherapy;
 - -Patients waiting for admission as a regular day or night attender.
 - -Maternity (specialties 510 and 520);
 - -Patients currently receiving inpatient treatment in hospitals who are included on other waiting lists;
 - -Patients who are temporarily suspended from waiting lists.
- 9. Waiting time begins from the date the clinician decided to admit the patient. Patients who cannot attend (CNA) have their waiting time adjusted to commence on the date they informed the HSC Trust they could not attend, while patients who do not attend (DNA) have their waiting time adjusted to commence on the date of the DNA.
- 10. The Ministerial target, for inpatient and day case waiting times, as set out in the Health and Social Care (Commissioning Plan) Direction states that, by March 2017, at least 55% of patients should wait no longer than 13 weeks for inpatient or day case treatment, with no patient waiting longer than 52 weeks.
- 11. A number of inpatient and day case services may not be provided at a patient's local HSC Trust or at each of the five HSC Trusts, and instead are provided at a single regional centre for Northern Ireland. In such circumstances, patients from one HSC Trust area will be waiting to be seen at a service provided at another HSC Trust. Users should therefore be cautious in how they use these data. For example, they should not be used to calculate the total number of patients waiting per head of the population residing within each Trust area, as HSC Trusts that provide services for the whole of Northern Ireland will have a higher number of patients waiting per head of the population than those that provide more localised services. Neither should the actual number of patients waiting longer than the recommended waiting time be used as indicator of poor performance within an individual HSC Trust. Users who require an indication of the latter are advised to refer to the commentary section of the publication which provides an indication of the percentage of total waiters that have been waiting over the maximum recommended waiting times, within each HSC Trust.
- 12. For Tables 2a, 2b, 3a and 3b, each inpatient and day case waiting time band relates to the number of completed weeks a patient has been waiting for admission for treatment. For example, a patient waiting exactly 6 weeks would be included in the 0-6 week time band and a patient waiting 6 weeks and 1 day would be included in the >6-13 (greater than 6 weeks but waiting no longer than 13

weeks) week time band. Patients waiting 'more than 13 weeks' includes all patients in the >13-21, >21–26, >26-52 and >52 time bands. Patients waiting 'more than 52 weeks' includes all patients in the >52 time band.

- 13. Patients waiting for day case endoscopies are included within both inpatient and diagnostic waiting times; as such, figures should not be added together.
- 14. The total number of completed inpatient waits within HSC hospitals each quarter is sourced from the Hospital Inpatient System. During the financial year, data from the Hospital Inpatient System will be marked as provisional. This is because information on inpatient admissions continuously improves during the year before being finalised. Consequently, quarterly information from the Hospital Inpatient System, for the most recent financial year, will be revised on a quarterly basis.
- 15. The number of completed inpatient waits within HSC hospitals each quarter do not include:
 - Elective planned patients
 - Emergency patients
 - Maternity (specialties 510 and 520)
 - Private patients
 - Amenity patients
 - Mental Health and Learning Disability patients
 - Others (including transfers)
- 16. The numbers of patients that received inpatient treatment, commissioned by the Health Service, in the Independent Sector, are provided by the HSC Board. They are not National Statistics and they have not been validated by the Department, however, they have been included to provide users with a comprehensive view of completed inpatient waits during each quarter.
- 17. HIB surveyed data providers during 2011/12 to ascertain the cost of producing, validating and submitting the information required for this publication. This relates to the time taken to generate, validate and submit data, over and above what is already required by their organisation for internal performance management purposes. The annual cost to data providers of compliance with HIB's requirements for this publication, based on HSC salary costs, was £1,670.
- 18. Figures relating to inpatient and day case waiting times for the quarter ending 30th June 2017 will be released on Thursday 31st August 2017.
