


Statistical Fact Sheet 2

Section 1: NI Domiciled applicants applying and applicants accepted to UK institutions through UCAS – 2008/09 to 2017/18 (2008-2017 UCAS cycles)

The chart and table below provide information on the number of NI domiciled applicants applying to and accepted to UK institutions, through the UCAS process.

- Over the decade between 2008/09 and 2017/18, the number of NI domiciled applicants applying to UK institutions increased by 21.6%, from 16,685 to 20,290. Over the same period, the number of NI domiciled applicants accepted to UK institutions increased by 7.0%, from 13,430 to 14,375.
- Between 2016/17 and 2017/18, the number of NI domiciled applicants <u>applying</u> to UK institutions decreased by 3.9%, from 21,105 to 20,290. Over the same period, the number of NI domiciled applicants <u>accepted</u> to UK institutions decreased by 2.9%, from 14,800 to 14,375.



Section 2: Applicants applying and applicants accepted to NI institutions through UCAS – 2008/09 to 2017/18 (2008-2017 UCAS cycles)

The chart and table below provide information on the number of applicants applying to and accepted to NI institutions, through the UCAS process.

- Over the decade between 2008/09 and 2017/18, the number of applicants <u>applying</u> to NI institutions increased by 34.6%, from 18,070 to 24,330. Over the same period, the number of applicants <u>accepted</u> to NI institutions increased by 3.9%, from 9,825 to 10,205.
- Between 2016/17 and 2017/18, the number of applicants <u>applying</u> to NI institutions decreased by 3.1% from 25,110 to 24,330. Over the same period, the number of applicants <u>accepted</u> to NI institutions decreased by 2.3%, from 10,450 to 10,205.
