About Neighbourhood Renewal

Neighbourhood Renewal is about closing the gap between the quality of life for people in the most deprived neighbourhoods and the rest of society. Neighbourhood Renewal has four interlinking strategic objectives:

- Community Renewal to develop confident communities that are able and committed to improving the quality of life in their areas;
- Economic Renewal to develop economic activity in the most deprived neighbourhoods and connect them to the wider urban economy;
- **Social Renewal** to improve social conditions for the people who live in the most deprived neighbourhoods through better co-ordinated public services and the creation of safer environments; and
- *Physical Renewal* to help create attractive, safe, sustainable environments in the most deprived neighbourhoods.

About Kilcooley Partnership

The Kilcooley Neighbourhood Partnership was established in February 2006 to take forward the Neighbourhood Renewal Programme. It has 2 sub groups to assist it in the identification, development and, where appropriate, delivery of projects in relation to Health /Sport/Recreation, and Education/Early Intervention. It has a varied membership including the Department for Regional Development, Education Authority, South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust, Community Reps, Northern Ireland Housing Executive, Police Service of Northern Ireland, Churches, Voluntary Sector, Public Health Authority, Kilcooley Primary School, Ards and Ards and North Down Borough Council and Councillors. It is defined as non-constituted entity acting in an advisory role to the Department for Neighbourhood Renewal issues in the designated Neighbourhood Renewal area. It currently meets on a 6 weekly basis and its administration services are provided through a Coordinator with North Down Borough Council.

The Partnership and Subgroups have all signed up to and abide by the Neighbourhood Renewal Code of Practice and Guiding Principles and subsequent Subgroup Terms of Reference

About Kilcooley Neighbourhood Area

The Kilcooley Neighbourhood Renewal Area covers the whole of the Kilcooley and Fern Grove estates which were built between 1967 and 1976. It is located approximately two miles west of Bangor town centre and is bounded by two major roads, the West Circular Road on the East and the Belfast Road on the West. It has an estimated population of 2,655 with approximately 79.4% coming from a Protestant and other Christian (including Christian related) community background and approximately 4.1% coming from a Catholic community background.



The Kilcooley Vision and Action Plan

The original Kilcooley Action Plan was developed in 2006 by the Kilcooley Neighbourhood Partnership as a response to the identified needs of the area.

These needs were identified through comprehensive consultation with local residents, statutory and voluntary organisations as well as utilising

Neighbourhood Renewal statistics. The Action plan has been updated on a yearly basis and encompasses current regeneration projects as well as the future projects that are required to meet the identified needs. As part of this process the partnership developed its ten year vision - 'Kilcooley will become an attractive, safe and prosperous estate where the residents enjoy healthy active lifestyles'.



Kilcooley Partnership Projects

The Neighbourhood Renewal Investment Fund has supported eight projects during the 2014/2015 financial year in the Kilcooley Neighbourhood Renewal Area as follows:-

COMMUNITY RENEWAL



1. Kilcooley Community Forum 5

Kilcooley Community Forum is an umbrella organization consisting of representatives from local community groups, Churches and Schools, and provides assistance and advice in day to day matters. They also provide a range of programmes focusing on community development, substance abuse, training placements, and assist groups in the development of / seeking funding for community projects. Kilcooley Community Forum has played an important role in a number of projects and schemes which have had a significant impact on the development of community services and tackling deprivation in the Kilcooley Neighbourhood Renewal Area. The project has been in place from 2005 and has continued to meet its targets during the past year.

2. Kilcooley Neighbourhood Partnership - Technical Assistance

Achievement of the Department for Social Development's strategic objectives is dependent on Technical Assistance being provided to continue to service the Kilcooley Neighbourhood Partnership. The neighbourhood partnership is a voluntary body composed of people from the community / voluntary, statutory and other sectors with recognised expertise and knowledge of the local area, working together to formulate and oversee the implementation of a neighbourhood Action Plan. It requires professional support to facilitate its operation and to manage and monitor day to day activities as they develop, and to ensure its contractual obligations to the Department for Social Development are met. In the longer term these actions will impact all Neighbourhood Renewal strategic objectives and will aid in the reduction in the gap between Kilcooley and the Northern Ireland average.



ECONOMIC RENEWAL



1. Ards and North Down Borough Council - Kilcooley Multi-functional Centre appraisal.

This Project I provided an independent economic appraisal to assess the quantitative and qualitative costs and benefits of the specified options, methodology, capital costs, sources of funding and timeframe in developing the Multi Functional Centre in Kilcooley. It looked at the cost implications of taking the project forward as a social economy project. The project was managed by North Down Borough Council.

SOCIAL RENEWAL - EDUCATION

1. Kilcooley Primary School Nurturing Project 2

Kilcooley Primary School Nurturing Project' has been in place from 2009 and operates from a location within Kilcooley Primary School managed by the Education Authority. It has continued to provide a small emotionally secure unit in a specially furnished classroom where children are cherished and their needs attended to in a structured environment. The project empowers children to develop trusting relationships with adults and respond appropriately to other children, prepares children to meet the social and intellectual demands of school life; and on becoming more secure emotionally pupils find that their capacity for cognitive learning increases and they make progress with normal school tasks. The project will be maintained by the Education Authority from 1st April 2015





2. Kilcooley Women's Centre STEP Project



Kilcooley Women's Centre STEP Project 2 has been supported by the Department for Social Development from 2011. The STEP project is managed by Kilcooley Women's Centre and is an educational project targeted at women, to enhance the transferrable skills, improve employment opportunities and life chances of the participants and to address educational underachievement in the Kilcooley area. The project offers a wide portfolio of training opportunities, catering for those with no formal qualifications to those who need to re-skill due to redundancy, return to work after bringing up a family, to move from benefits, unemployed/



economically inactive or for those in low paid occupations. The training takes place in Kilcooley primary School, a safe, supportive environment, in a community setting with built in support mechanisms. It offers courses up to A-level and City and Guilds with crèche facilities available for the needs of mothers. The Women's Centre also provides onsite childcare which encourages single parents, unemployed and those in the transition from benefits to work, to benefit from affordable accessible childcare.

3. Kilcooley SEELB Transitions Programme

This project provides a range of programmes to Nurture the Transition of pupils from Years 6 and 7 in Kilcooley Primary School to Year 8 in Bangor Academy & Sixth Form College, and Priory Integrated College. It involves work with parents and adults from the Kilcooley area.

Teachers from each of the schools undertake extra hours to co- ordinate the transition programme.

The project is based in Kilcooley Primary School and has five programmes:



- Reading Partnership Programme -Year 13 pupils visit Kilcooley Primary School to provide Reading Partnership support to identified children in Kilcooley Primary School.
- Numeracy *Together Programme* A numeracy programme providing additional support through the medium of ICT.
- Parental Engagement Programme A programme of events to raise awareness of the importance of the transition year and support parents.
- Pupil and Parent Transition Programme Additional support for pupils and parents during the transition period including joint visits to schools.
- Home/School Yr8 Transition Support Designated teachers will agree a home-school support service where additional needs are identified.

SOCIAL RENEWAL - HEALTH

1. South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust Early Intervention Family Project

This project has been supported from 2012 and is managed by South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust. It continues to provide parents with support from the antenatal stage to ensure children have a good start in life and are sustained into later life. It strengthens services at crisis points in their lives and at the transition stages of home to pre-school, pre-school to primary and from primary school to post primary.

The project has two elements, - **New Parent Visitor Programme** - which focuses on new parents, providing frequent ante-natal and post-natal visits to support parents until the child is 2 years, and a complementary **Family Support Home Visiting Service/Parenting Programme**, which offers practical and emotional support to families and children aged 0 - 11 during difficult periods in their lives. It focuses particularly on behaviour / crises in the home, and around the transition stages in a child's life: nursery - primary school and primary - post primary school The main aims of this project are to help parents raise securely attached children through early intervention during pregnancy, and to provide support that will reduce the risk of problems arising providing a service to families who are experiencing chronic, well established problems thus reducing the need for the formal services of Statutory agencies.



SOCIAL RENEWAL - CRIME

1. Bangor Alternatives Project

The project is managed by Bangor Alternatives and has supported non-protocol related activities from 2008. The project is a community based community safety project that provides a number of preventative and intervention strategies to tackle the issue of anti-social behaviour and community conflict and its impact on individuals and communities by providing a number of services.

It offers protective activities to redirect young people away from crime and offer victims a forum to have their concerns addressed and hurts healed. Additionally officers engage in detached youth work, provide prevention programmes and deliver workshops within a schools setting. It also operates a wide variety of user-led programs to tackle sensitive community issues.

Kilcooley Partnership Conclusion

In the 2014/2015 financial year, Kilcooley Partnership total overall spend at June 2014 was £266,524.05.

This can be further broken down into Strategic Objective spend as follows:-

Community Renewal £56,879.19

Social Renewal £207,674.36

Economic Renewal £1,970.50

Physical Renewal £0.00 (a number of physical projects are in the development stage but did not incur spend 14/15)

Breakdown of actual achievements for total expenditure

The Kilcooley NRA is a Protestant/Unionist/Loyalist area which is marked by very low levels of educational achievement. The Kilcooley Partnership as previous years has therefore continued to focus on the development of educational skills both at primary school age and in mature women students. To compliment the primary element the nurture unit has continued its activities within Kilcooley Primary School, providing assistance to those pupils who require help and then integration back into normal school life. The success of the Nurturing has resulted in the Education Authority agreeing to fund it in full from the 1st April 2015. The continuation of the Kilcooley South Eastern Health and Social Care Trust Early Intervention Family Project also aids this ethos providing a family health and parenting element that improves early age health and wellbeing as well as the preparing children for school life. The SEELB Transitions Programme has also been successfully targeting pupils at the transition stage of moving from Primary to Secondary education, this project involves both primary and secondary pupils. In relation to adult education the Kilcooley Women's Centre STEP Project 2 continues to provide education courses for women, during the current year it provided 228 women with courses and 13 participants have been able to find work. These education projects have an impact on economic outputs and will have future bearing on worklessness and the quality of jobs obtained. The Kilcooley Forum 5 Project and North Down Alternatives project continue to provide a community backdrop for all these projects providing direction for the community and reducing crime in the area. In the 2015/2016 financial year £215,655.64 has already has been approved mainly to continue the current educational focus, but also covering such issues as community development, community safety and early health interventions in families. Additionally the Health Authority has agreed to fund the Nurturing Project was originally developed and funded by DSD.
