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REDUCTION IN PRIME CATTLE CARCASE WEIGHTS DURING MAY 2020

The average prime cattle carcase weight in NI during May was 340.4kg, back from an average of 343.9kg during May 2019. The decline in the average carcase weight during May 2020 goes against recent trends which have shown a steady increase in the average carcase weight of prime cattle being processed in local plants

Steers

The average steer carcase weight in NI during May 2020 was 357.2kg, back 3.8kg from May 2019 when the average carcase weight was 361kg as outlined in **Figure 1**.

One factor which may have contributed to this drop in the average carcase weight was a reduction in the average age at slaughter to 767 days (25.2 months) during May 2020. This was back by 12 days from May 2019. There was no change to the origin of steers killed locally year on year with 57 per cent of steers processed during May 2020 originating from the suckler herd.

Heifers

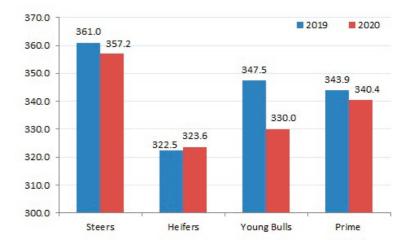
The average heifer carcase weight was 323.6kg during May 2020 in NI, up marginally from May 2019 when it was 322.5kg. This slight increase in the heifer carcase weight occurred despite heifers being killed four days earlier on average at 781 days (25.7 months) and also a decrease in the proportion of the heifer kill sourced from the suckler herd to 61 per cent. During May 2019 64 per cent of price reported heifers were of suckler origin.

Young Bulls

The most notable change however has been in the average carcase weight of young bulls. During May 2020 the average carcase weight of young bulls killed in NI was 330kg, back 17.5kg from the 347.5kg recorded in May 2019.

A reduction in the average age at slaughter by 10 days to 471 days (15.5 months) may have contributed to this trend but the biggest driver in this decline was the reduction in the proportion of suckler origin young bulls in the slaughter mix. During May 2019 suckler origin bulls accounted for 54 per cent of all price reported young bulls in NI and this was back to 46 per cent in May 2020.

PRIME CATTLE THROUGHPUT IN ROI RETURNS TO MORE TYPICAL LEVELS

Last week prime cattle throughput in beef processing plants in ROI increased to 23,611 head which is just ahead of the corresponding week last year when 23,230 prime cattle were processed.

This increase in the prime cattle kill in ROI marked the return of prime cattle throughput in the region to more typical levels as outlined in **Figure 2** below. Since Covid-19 restrictions came into place in ROI in late March this year prime cattle throughput was significantly behind what would be expected at this time of year.

Prime cattle throughput in beef processing plants in ROI from late March this year through to late May was lower than previous years. During this ten week period 215,066 prime cattle passed through ROI plants, a reduction of just under 37,000 head or 15 per cent from the corresponding period in 2019.

Cow throughput

Cow throughput in ROI beef plants followed a similar trend to the prime cattle kill and recorded a significant decline during the ten week period ending 30 May 2020. However there has been a recovery in the number of cows passing through ROI beef plants with 8,201 cows processed in the region last week.

During the ten week period ending 30 May 2020 54,509 cows were

processed in ROI beef plants, back by 13,679 head or 20 per cent from the same period in 2019.

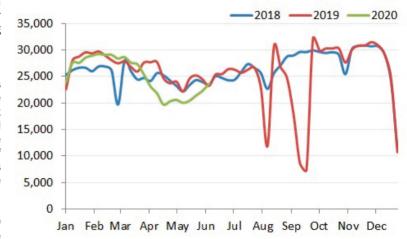
Increased cattle availability?

With the notable reduction in both prime cattle and cow throughput in ROI beef plants during the last few months there is a concern that this has contributed to a backlog of cattle for processing on farms in ROI. Reports have indicated that this could potentially contribute to an increased supply of Irish beef coming onto the market later in 2020.

With approximately fifty per cent of Irish beef production destined for the UK retail and food service markets each year this potential increase in cattle availability for slaughter in the region later this year could have an impact on both the NI and GB deadweight trade.

The reduction in cattle throughput in ROI during the last few weeks/months has been a contributing factor behind the strong improvement in deadweight beef prices in NI with a reduction of beef coming onto the market. This reduction in the volume of beef being processed in ROI has also coincided with a significant tightening in the availability of locally produced cattle for NI processing plants. This has also contributed to the improvement in deadweight prices in NI as it has created competition for cattle between the major processors.

Deadweight Cattle Trade

With supplies of prime cattle for processing in NI remaining tight base quotes from the major processing plants improved by 6p/kg this week. Base quotes for in-spec U-3 grading steers and heifers ended this week ranging from 346-352p/kg. With a range in the base quotes available producers are encouraged to shop around for the best deal and to use these quotes as a starting point for negotiation. Quotes for 0+3 grading cows this week held steady ranging from 260-275p/kg. Similar quotes are expected for all types of cattle early next week.

Last week 6,748 prime cattle were processed in NI beef processing plants. This was up by 1,101 head from the 5,647 prime cattle processed during the previous week and is the highest weekly throughput of prime cattle recorded in NI since the first week of April 2020. However while numbers have recovered they remain behind the 6,999 prime cattle processed locally in the same week last year. Cow throughput also increased last week with 1,878 cows processed in local plants. This was up from the 1,645 cows processed during the previous week and the highest level of throughput recorded since mid-March this year.

There was a strong increase in the number of cattle imported from ROI for direct slaughter in local plants last week. There were 714 prime cattle and 325 cows imported from ROI last week, up from 463 prime cattle and 130 cows imported during the previous week. This is the third consecutive week in which cattle imports from ROI for direct slaughter have recorded an increase. Meanwhile exports of cattle out of NI for direct slaughter last week continued to run at low levels with 19 cows exported from NI to ROI while no cattle were exported from NI to GB.

Tight prime cattle supplies continue to influence the NI deadweight trade with increases reported last week across the majority of grades. The average NI steer price last week held steady at 345.9p/kg while the R3 steer price was up by 1.6p/kg to 354.7p/kg. The average NI heifer price last week was up 4.5p/kg to 350.1p/kg while the R3 heifer price increased by 5.4p/kg to 357.5 p/kg. The average young bull price in NI last week increased by 3p/kg to 336.5p/kg while the R3 young bull price was up by 5p/kg to 347.4p/kg. Meanwhile the O3 cow price in NI last week was back by 1.3p/kg to 278.6p/kg however the average cow price increased by 4.6p/kg to 265.2p/kg.

The deadweight trade for prime cattle in GB also improved strongly last week. The average GB steer price last week was up by 7.8p/kg to 352.6p/kg while the average R3 steer price reported an increase of 8.6p/kg to 360.2p/kg. The differential between NI and the GB R3 steer price last week was 5.5p/kg. The average heifer price in GB last week was 354p/kg, up 7.8p/kg while the R3 heifer price increased by 8.8p/kg to 360.7p/kg. This puts the R3 heifer price in GB 3.2p/kg above NI levels.

In ROI last week the R3 steer price was the equivalent of 325.1p/kg, back 0.8p/kg from the previous week. Meanwhile the R3 heifer price in ROI last week was the equivalent of 329.7p/kg, back just under a penny from the previous week and 27.8p/kg below the equivalent price in NI.

Deadweight Sheep Trade

Quotes from the plants this week for R3 grading lambs ranged from 470-480p/kg up to 21kg. Quotes for early next week are expected to range from 440-460p/kg up to 21kg. Lamb throughput in NI plants last week totalled 8,801 head. This was back marginally from the previous week however well ahead of the same week in 2019 when 8,218 lambs were processed locally. A further 4,716 lambs were exported to ROI for direct slaughter last week, back 407 head from the previous week. In the same week last year 3,383 lambs were exported to ROI for direct slaughter. Last week the average NI deadweight lamb price decreased by 18.9p/kg to 472.1p/kg. In the corresponding week last year the deadweight lamb price was 423.7p/kg. In ROI last week the average lamb price was the equivalent of 484.9p/kg, back 15.9p/kg from the previous week.

Liveweight Sheep Trade

This week a good trade was reported across the marts with steady numbers passing through many of the sale rings. In Swatragh last Saturday 390 lambs sold from 435-479p/kg compared to 500 lambs the previous week selling from 434-488p/kg. On Monday in Kilrea 370 lambs sold from 459-471p/kg compared to 390 lambs last week selling from 448-466p/kg. On Tuesday in Saintfield 408 lambs sold from 440-480p/kg compared to 402 lambs selling from 440-490p/kg last week. In Ballymena this week a good entry of 1,320 lambs sold from 430-464p/kg (avg 440p/kg) compared to 889 lambs last week selling from 445-483p/kg (avg 452p/kg). Top reported prices for cull ewes ranged from £88-£146.
