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AA CALF REGISTRATIONS INCREASE

During 2019 there were 82,657 Aberdeen Angus calves registered in Northern Ireland which represented a 7.9 per cent increase from the previous year and a 19.2 per cent increase from 2016 levels.

The notable increase in Aberdeen Angus calf registrations over the past number of years has been well documented, with most of the increase in Aberdeen Angus calf registrations in Northern Ireland originating from the dairy herd.

A number of factors have contributed to the increasing numbers including positive market signals from processors in the forms of bonuses at points of slaughter for animals that meet market specifications. The smaller birth weights, shorter gestations and a higher value young calf are also attractive to dairy producers, particularly now with the increasing effectiveness of sexed semen meaning more cows can be served using a beef sire.

Aberdeen Angus calf registrations have been growing in all regions of the United Kingdom in response to positive market signals

The growth in Aberdeen Angus calf registrations has not just been confined to Northern Ireland, the upward trend in calf registrations can also be observed

in all regions of Great Britain as outlined in **Figure 1**.

During 2016 there were 321,026 Aberdeen Angus calf registrations in Great Britain and this increased to 398,844 registrations during 2019. This accounts for a 24 per cent increase over the time year period with an additional 77,818 Aberdeen Angus calves registered.

During 2016 Aberdeen Angus calves accounted for 17 per cent of all beef sired calf registrations in Great Britain and this proportion has steadily increased to account for 21 per cent in 2019.

The increased numbers of Aberdeen Angus calf registrations is now being reflected in the local slaughter mix. During 2019 20 per cent of the price reported prime cattle kill in Northern Ireland were Aberdeen Angus, up from 14 per cent in 2016. At present this information is not available for the other UK regions but it is expected to have followed the same trend.

Hereford calf registrations

During 2019 there were 29,095 Hereford calves registered in Northern Ireland. This represents a 2.4 per cent increase from the previous year. While the number of Hereford calves being registered has increased it has not shown the same level of growth as

Aberdeen Angus. Hereford calf registrations have however increased their share of overall beef sired calf registrations at the expense of the continental breeds in Northern Ireland, in particular Charolais and Limousin.

Hereford calf registrations have increased in all regions of the United Kingdom between 2016 and 2019

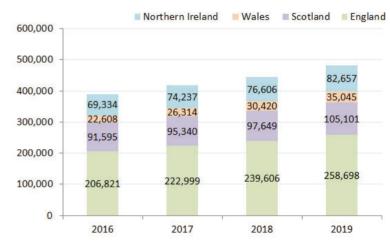
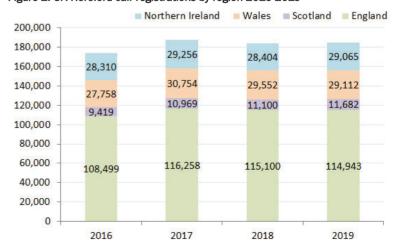


Figure 2: UK Hereford calf registrations by region 2016-2019

Hereford calf registrations have also shown an increase in all regions of Great Britain as outlined in **Figure 2**. During 2006 there were 145,676 Hereford calves registered in Great Britain and this increased to 155,737 head by 2019. This increase by 10,061 head accounts for a seven per cent increase over this period. During 2016 Hereford calves accounted for 7.9 per cent of all beef sired calves registered in Great Britain and this increased to 8.3 per cent during 2019.

With Hereford calves accounting for a slightly larger proportion of calf registrations in Northern Ireland over the past few years they are also making up a slightly bigger proportion of the prime cattle kill. Hereford cattle accounted for seven per cent of the price reported prime cattle kill in NI during 2019. This proportion has been steadily increasing from five per cent in 2016.

Figure 1: UK Aberdeen Angus calf registrations by region 2016-2019

DEADWEIGHT BEEF TRADE HOLDS STEADY

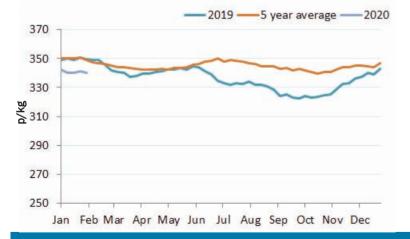


Figure 4: R3 steer prices in NI, GB and ROI during the 52 w/e 01 Feb 2020

The deadweight trade for prime cattle began to show signs of recovery in Northern Ireland during the last few months of 2019 and the trade has held relatively steady during the first few weeks of 2020 as outlined in **Figure 4**.

However despite the stability in the beef trade in recent weeks deadweight prices remain below the five year average R3 steer price as outlined in Figure 3. Prices fell below the five year average in early June 2019 and despite a narrowing of the differential in recent months have remained below the five year average line.

It is however worth noting that the five year average R3 steer price includes two years in which beef prices in Northern Ireland were particularly strong for a variety of reasons including supply and demand issues for beef, global trade and demand for beef by-products along with the influences of currency exchange rates. Current deadweight prices for prime cattle in Northern Ireland are operating at similar levels to late 2016.

While the beef trade has been under pressure in all parts of the United Kingdom deadweight prices remain ahead of equivalent prices in the European Union where the trade has come under similar pressure over the last year. The latest EU Deadweight Cattle Prices League Table puts R3 heifer prices in Northern Ireland the third highest in the European Union and 27.6c/kg ahead of the EU average during the w/e 26 January 2020.

The deadweight cattle trade in Northern

Ireland has been operating at similar levels to Great Britain in recent weeks as outlined in **Figure 4**. At several stages over the past year deadweight prices in Great Britain have been operating ahead of Northern Ireland prices however this differential has been eroded in recent months. The R3 steer price in Northern Ireland last week was 340p/kg, 1.2p/kg behind the 341.2p/kg paid in Great Britain.

The deadweight cattle trade has come under significant pressure in the Republic of Ireland since June 2019. While there has been an improvement in recent weeks deadweight prices in the region are significantly lower than equivalent prices in Northern Ireland as outlined in **Figure 4**.

The R3 steer price in the Republic of Ireland last week was the equivalent of 309.4p/kg, 30.6p/kg behind the Northern Ireland price. Strong supplies of cattle for slaughter combined with a weaker euro against sterling have contributed to this wider price differential between the regions.

Figure 3: R3 steer prices in NI during 2019 and 2020 against the 5 year average

Deadweight Cattle Trade

Base quotes for in spec U-3 grade prime cattle ranged from 324-334p/kg this week with the majority of plants quoting 332-334p/kg for steers and heifers. Quotes from the plants for good quality 0+3 grading cows this week ranged from 240-250p/kg. Similar quotes are expected for all types of cattle early next week.

Prime cattle throughput in local plants totalled 7,076 head last week which was similar to the previous week. This brings total throughput of prime cattle for January 2020 to 33,334 head which is marginally lower than the 33,421 prime cattle slaughtered in local plants during January 2019. Cow throughput in local plants totalled 2,014 head last week, again similar to the previous week. Throughput for cows in January 2020 has totalled 9,761 head up 7.5 per cent from the 9,081 cows slaughtered in January 2019.

Cattle imports for direct slaughter from ROI last week consisted of 229 prime cattle and 64 cows with a further 3 steers and 92 cows imported from GB. During January 2020 a total of 1,349 prime cattle were imported to NI from GB and ROI compared to 1,596 prime cattle imported from the same regions in January last year. Meanwhile exports out of NI to ROI for direct slaughter last week consisted of 12 prime cattle, 53 cows and nine bulls, with no cattle exported to plants in GB.

The average steer price in NI last week increased by 0.6p/kg to 333.2p/kg however the R3 steer price was back by 1.3p/kg to 340p/kg. The average heifer price reported an increase of just over a penny last week to 336.4p/kg with the R3 heifer price up by 1.4p/kg to 342.5p/kg. The average young bull price in NI last week was 314.9p/kg, back 0.6p/kg while the R3 young bull price was back by a penny to 325.9p/kg. The average cow price in NI last week increased by 0.9p/kg to 238.4p/kg however the O3 cow price decreased by 2.4p/kg to 254.8p/kg.

In GB last week the average steer price held steady at 332.7p/kg with the R3 steer price up by 0.8p/kg to 341.2p/kg. Across the regions declines in R3 steer prices were reported in Scotland (-0.3p/kg) and Southern England (-1.6p/kg) with increases reported in Midlands (+0.5p/kg) and Northern England (+3.9p/kg). The overall average heifer price in GB increased by 0.8p/kg to 333.4p/kg with the R3 heifer price up by a similar margin to 340p/kg. The R3 heifer price came back in all regions except in Northern England where it was up 5.9p/kg to 341.4p/kg. In GB last week the cow trade firmed with the average 03 cow price increasing by 3.5p/kg to 252p/kg which was 2.8p/kg lower than the 03 cow price in NI

In ROI last week the R3 steer price was up by the equivalent of 0.7p/kg to 309.4p/kg with the R3 heifer price holding steady at 313.8p/kg. This puts the ROI R3 steer price at 30.6p/kg below the equivalent NI price with the ROI R3 heifer price at 28.7p/kg below the same price in NI. The O3 cow price in ROI increased by 2.1p/kg last week to the equivalent of 242p/kg.

Deadweight Sheep Trade

Quotes from the major processors for R3 grading hoggets this week ranged from 430-445p/kg up to 22kg with similar quotes expected early next week. There were 7,174 hoggets killed in local plants last week, back 912 head from the previous week. This brings total throughput for hoggets in January 2020 to 39,234 head, up 28.6 per cent when compared to the 30,512 hoggets killed in January 2019. Last week 6,529 hoggets were exported from NI to ROI for direct slaughter taking the total for January 2020 to 36,144 head. This was a 4.2 per cent decrease from the 37,723 hoggets exported to the region in January 2019. The deadweight hogget price in NI last week was 435p/kg, up 3.8p/kg from the previous week. In the same week last year the NI deadweight hogget price was 436.9p/kg.

This week's marts

Steady numbers of hoggets along with a steady trade have been reported across the local marts this week. In Omagh last Saturday 803 hoggets sold from 414-462p/kg while in Swatragh 710 hoggets sold from 385-443p/kg. In Saintfield this week a similar trade to last week was reported with 620 hoggets selling from 400-440p/kg. On Wednesday in Ballymena 1,410 hoggets sold from 385-464p/kg (avg 410p/kg) compared to 1,760 hoggets last week selling from 390-460p/kg (avg 410p/kg). In Armoy this week 364 hoggets sold from 408-458p/kg compared to 346 hoggets last week selling from 394-445p/kg. Good numbers of ewes passed through the marts this week with top reported prices ranging from £100-149.
