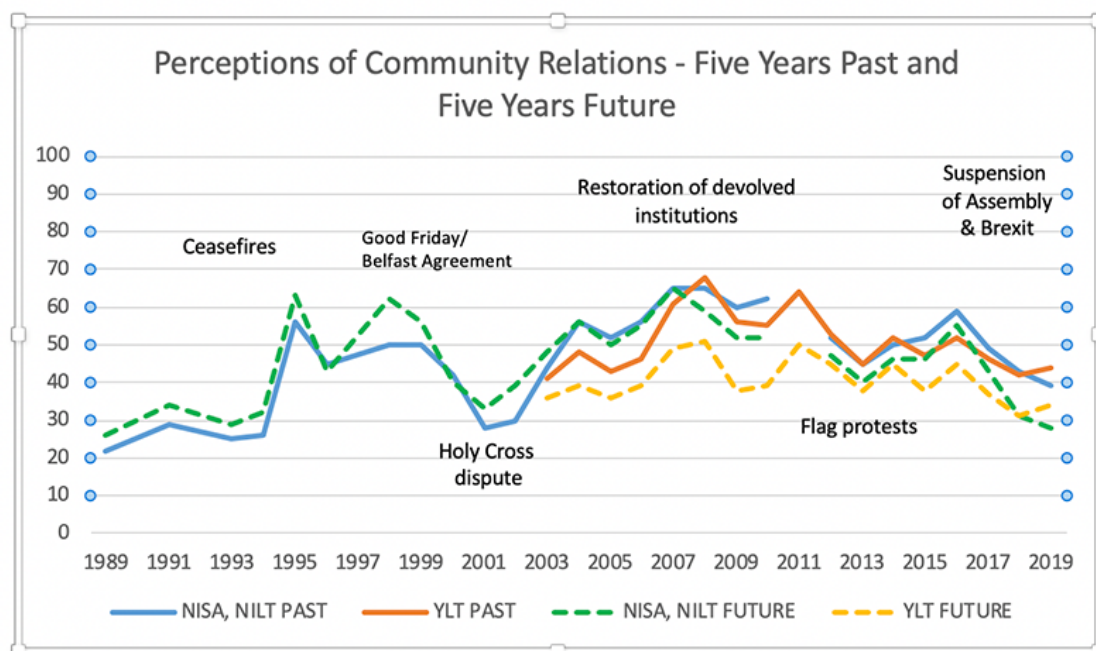

Perceptions of Community Relations

ARK Data Series for 30 years



2020 marks special anniversaries for two important organisations focusing on good relations: Community Relations Council (CRC) is celebrating its 30th anniversary, while ARK is ten years younger.

In 2000, researchers at Queen's University and Ulster University launched ARK – Northern Ireland's Social Policy hub. ARK's main goal

is to increase the accessibility and use of academic data and research relating to society and politics in Northern Ireland.

Connecting Young People

Strive Good Relations Programme



A special online programme aimed at youths has brought together 8,000 people.

Youth work is built on face to face contact, but due to the current Covid 19 pandemic, online youth work has become an important means of providing youth provision.

Strive is a good relations programme for young people aged 14 to 24, led by Include Youth in partnership with Youth Initiatives (a core funded group of the Community Relations Council), and several other organisations.

In May and June 2020, Strive hosted two regional activities on social media, as an alternative to meeting in person, and involved young people across Northern Ireland and County Donegal.

"I am convinced that supporting the people to build stronger relationships and to see that a shared and integrated society makes sense for everyone is key to building a strong future for our community.

"I also believe that we need to hold challenging and difficult conversations in a respectful manner and, that when we entrust the community to arrive at solutions to issues that separate us, we will radically and positively change Northern Ireland.

"I got into peacebuilding and community relations work because I believe that each of us has a role to play in building strong relationships in society and I wanted to play my part in encouraging those who we do not often hear from to have a voice..."
