CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19)



Rebuilding Health and Social Care services

A concerted effort is underway across Health and Social Care (HSC) to rebuild services disrupted by the coronavirus pandemic.

A significant amount of hospital, social, community and primary care services were scaled back to ensure there were enough staff, resources and capacity to cope with the predicted surge of COVID-19 cases.



The Department of Health has published a Strategic Framework for Rebuilding Health and Social Care Services. The six Health and Social Care Trusts have also published plans setting out a series of actions to rebuild their services in the immediate period to 30 June.

These plans include an ongoing emphasis on high priority cancer services, and other urgent conditions, as well as on supporting and protecting vulnerable members of society.

Support available for young carers

There are around 310, 000 carers in Northern Ireland, with an estimated 98,000 more since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. Before lockdown, almost 4% of carers were young carers.

During Carers' Week, we highlight the Regional Young Carers' Service in Northern Ireland which is funded by the Health and Social Care Board. Provided by Action for Children and Barnardo's, it delivers support, information and guidance to carers aged from 8 – 18 years old.



Young carers are children and young people who may help to look after a relative with a disability, illness, mental health condition or drug and alcohol related problem. They carry out lots of extra jobs in and around the house such as; cooking, cleaning or helping a family member get dressed and move around their home.

New ID cards for carers



A new ID card to support carers in Northern Ireland is now available.

Similar to IDs for healthcare workers, carers will be able to show their ID in stores to get access to priority shopping hours.

Extra funding support for foster carers

The Health and Social Care Board has secured additional funding approved by the Department of Health to support foster carers during the current COVID-19 pandemic.

This financial support will be made available to all foster carers across Northern Ireland for a period of up to 12 weeks commencing in June 2020 and will be kept under review as circumstances change. More at: bit.ly/3dTKxwh

PPE order arrives from China

The first consignment of personal protective equipment from China has arrived in Northern Ireland.

A total of 1.5 million Type 11R respirator masks arrived in Belfast in recent days, with the remainder of the order to be delivered in a phased basis over coming weeks.



The total value of the contract is just over £60m.
