


## Statistical Fact Sheet 2

# Section 1: NI Domiciled applicants applying and applicants accepted to UK institutions through UCAS – 2007/08 to 2016/17 (2007-2016 UCAS cycles)

The chart and table below provide information on the number of NI domiciled applicants applying to and accepted to UK institutions, through the UCAS process.

- Over the decade between 2007/08 and 2016/17, the number of NI domiciled applicants applying to UK institutions increased by 25.5%. Over the same period, the number of NI domiciled applicants accepted to UK institutions increased by 13.8%.
- Between 2015/16 and 2016/17, the number of NI domiciled applicants <u>applying</u> to UK institutions increased by 1.4%. Over the same period, the number of NI domiciled applicants <u>accepted</u> to UK institutions increased by 5.3%.



# Section 2: Applicants applying and applicants accepted to NI institutions through UCAS – 2007/08 to 2016/17 (2007-2016 UCAS cycles)

The chart and table below provide information on the number of applicants applying to and accepted to NI institutions, through the UCAS process.

- Over the decade between 2007/08 and 2016/17, the number of applicants <u>applying</u> to NI institutions increased by 32.1%. Over the same period, the number of applicants <u>accepted</u> to NI institutions increased by 12.5%.
- Between 2015/16 and 2016/17, the number of applicants <u>applying</u> to NI institutions decreased by 2.8%. Over the same period, the number of applicants <u>accepted</u> to NI institutions increased by 2.8%.
