




# Higher Education Statistical Fact Sheet 2: UCAS applicants and accepted applicants - 2011/12 to 2020/21

Section 1: NI Domiciled applicants applying and applicants accepted to UK institutions through UCAS - 2011/12 to 2020/21 (2011-2020 UCAS cycles)

The chart and table below provide information on the number of NI domiciled applicants applying to and accepted to UK institutions, through the UCAS process.

- Over the decade between 2011/12 and 2020/21, the number of NI domiciled applicants applying to UK institutions decreased by a net 9.4%, from 20,030 to 18,150. Over the same period, the number of NI domiciled applicants accepted to UK institutions increased by a net 9.2%, from 13,790 to 15,065.
- Between 2019/20 and 2020/21, the number of NI domiciled applicants <u>applying</u> to UK institutions decreased by 2.0%, from 18,520 to 18,150. Over the same period, the number of NI domiciled applicants <u>accepted</u> to UK institutions increased by 8.3%, from 13,905 to 15.065.



## Section 2: Applicants applying and applicants accepted to NI institutions through UCAS – 2011/12 to 2020/21 (2011-2020 UCAS cycles)

The chart and table below provide information on the number of applicants applying to and accepted to NI institutions, through the UCAS process.

- Over the decade between 2011/12 and 2020/2021, the number of applicants <u>applying</u> to NI institutions decreased slightly, from 22,190 to 22,180. Over the same period, the number of applicants <u>accepted</u> to NI institutions increased by a net 26.8%, from 9,550 to 12,105.
- Between 2019/20 and 2020/21, the number of applicants <u>applying</u> to NI institutions decreased by a net 3.0%, from 22,860 to 22,180. Over the same period, the number of applicants <u>accepted</u> to NI institutions increased by a net 13.3%, from 10,680 to 12,105.
