Foreword

Chairperson and Councillors Armagh City, Banbridge & Craigavon Borough Council

I have pleasure in submitting my second Annual Report on TransportNI work in the Armagh City, Banbridge & Craigavon Borough Council area.

Southern Division covers the three Council areas shown on page 4 of this report. It is one of four Divisions, each of which manages the road network, commissions new works, and is the contact point for road users and public representatives.

This report deals with works completed in the Armagh City, Banbridge & Craigavon Borough Council area during the year 2015/2016 and sets out our initial proposals for schemes to be undertaken in the year 2016/2017.

There are pressures on both capital and resource funding going into 2016-17. On the capital side, my staff will continue to develop resurfacing and traffic management schemes to enhance safety, to improve traffic flow and provide measures for pedestrians and cyclists. The Department will also continue to bid in monitoring rounds for further capital funding for structural maintenance to maintain the integrity of the road network.

On the resource side, we start the year only being able to deliver a limited routine maintenance service. However, if in-year bids in monitoring rounds are successful funding will immediately be used to normalise the service.

On 9 May this year TransportNI became part of the new Department for Infrastructure. Whilst this is a significant change it should have no direct impact on the service provided by TransportNI.

However, over the last year TransportNI has undergone significant change as a result of the Northern Ireland Civil Service Voluntary Exit Scheme. As I highlighted at our meeting last year this has resulted in significant staff reductions across the Division and has required us to restructure our staffing levels across all areas of work.

With reduced staff we will be concentrating our efforts on delivering the highest priority work on the ground, within our allocated budgets. We remain committed to delivery of improvements to the network and councillors should be aware that this will be at the expense of assessing and reassessing requests for proposals which have limited prospect of delivery. To ensure continuity of service we are streamlining our processes for assessing requests to ensure best value for public money and the optimal use of our physical and financial resources.

I hope that you find this report informative. TransportNI values constructive comment on all its activities, and I, along with John Hall and Ian Campbell (Section Engineers) look forward to meeting the Council.

Regulation of new additions to the Network

Southern Division is one of four Client Divisions within TransportNI. It spans the local Council areas of Armagh City, Banbridge and Craigavon, Newry Mourne and Down and Ards and North Down Council Areas (see map below).



In Southern Division we are responsible for approximately 8000km of public road together with 1300 bridges, 250 sets of traffic lights, 81,000 streetlights and over 4000 illuminated signs and bollards. We carry out functions under the headings:-

- Strategic Road Improvements Road Improvement Schemes greater than £1.5Million on the strategic road network
- Network Maintenance Maintenance of existing network
- Network Development Improvements to the existing network
- · Network Planning Regulation of proposed additions to the network by developers

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SECTION 1

STRATEGIC ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

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1.1 A99 Extension To Millennium Way, Lurgan

The scheme involves the construction of 430 metres of new road between Malcolm Road and Gilford Road and upgrading of the existing junctions of Millennium Way with Malcolm Road and Gilford Road/Banbridge Road.

The new road, which also accommodates cyclists and pedestrians, will reduce congestion within the area and traffic flows through the local residential areas.

Progress

The construction contract has now been awarded and construction of the new road will commence on 23 May. It is expected that the works will be completed in November 2016.

Advance works including site clearance, demolition of buildings along Malcolm Road and utility alterations have already been carried out.

Unfortunately, disruption is likely with any project of this nature. TransportNI staff will be working closely with the contractor to minimise any inconvenience to the public and local businesses.

1.2 A1 Junctions Phase 2

A1 Junctions Phase 2

This proposal, which is estimated to cost in the range £40-£50million, involves the construction of four grade separated junctions to facilitate the closing up of all openings in the central median and installation of a continuous central safety barrier between Hillsborough Roundabout and Loughbrickland improving road safety for all road users on the A1.

In addition, the proposal includes the provision of a northbound on-slip at Castlewellan Road at Banbridge a link between the existing underpass junction at Hillsborough Road, Dromore and Milebush Road and the closing of some minor road junctions along this section of the A1.

Progress

TransportNI officials met with directly impacted landowners in September/October 2015 prior to a leaflet drop confirming the Preferred Option to all properties along the affected stretch of the A1.

- Listullycurran Road Blue Option
- Gowdystown Road Green Option
- Skeltons Road/Drumneath Road Purple Option
- Waringsford Road Brown Option

A significant amount of development work has already been progressed however, much remains to be done. The current phase of this work involves the completion of the design and preparing an Environmental Statement in preparation for taking the proposal through the statutory procedures, which will likely include a Public Inquiry.

1.2 A1 Junctions Phase 2 (cont)

Progress

A strategy is being developed to implement incremental improvements in advance of the full proposal. This involves erecting sections of central median safety barrier and where possible, closing up existing median gaps which facilitate right turn manoeuvres.

The first such improvement involves the closure of the median at Hillsborough to prevent the right turn movement for southbound traffic into Moira Road and the erection of a central safety barrier in the locality subject to the availability of funding and satisfactory progression through the statutory procedures.

Progression to construction remains subject to the proposal clearing the statutory procedures, having a satisfactory economic appraisal and, given other competing priorities, is dependent on funding being made available in future budget settlements.

1.3 A28 Armagh East Link

Following a Public Information event held in June 2014 the Preferred Corridor for the proposal was reviewed.

The review included consideration of the preferred corridor emerging further out the A28 Markethill Road at the Edenaveys Industrial Estate and has identified viable alternative options which are now subject to a stage 2 assessment before a preferred option can be confirmed. It is anticipated that this assessment will be completed in Autumn 2016.

Delivery of the scheme remains subject to clearing the statutory procedures, having a satisfactory economic appraisal and the availability of funding in future budget settlements.

1.4 A3 Armagh North & West Link

Consideration of options for a preferred line and junction strategy based on the 'out of town' corridor linking the A3 Portadown Road to the A3 Monaghan Road is continuing.

It would not be appropriate to make a decision on the preferred route at this time, pending confirmation of proposals for the Mullinure shared education campus highlighted in the draft Armagh City Centre Masterplan 2030.

Delivery of the scheme remains subject to clearing the statutory procedures, having satisfactory an economic appraisal and the availability of funding in future budget settlements.

1.5 Maintenance of Structures

Highway Structures include bridges, sign gantries and retaining walls. All bridges must be capable of carrying 40 tonne vehicles and this requirement has led to the ongoing assessment of bridges in the area.

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Explanation of Maintenance Operations

Resurfacing and Strengthening

- Roads generally fail by cracking and rutting. They usually do not fail suddenly, but gradually
 deteriorate due to the impact of traffic, age and weathering. Wear normally appears as either
 excessive permanent deformation of the whole or part of the carriageway structure, or is
 associated with the cracking of the bituminous layers.
- Roads are normally designed for an operational life of 20 years. During this period and beyond, there is a need for the highway authority to intervene at times to either treat or replace the top layer of bituminous material known as the "wearing course" or to provide additional depth to preserve the underlying structure of the road and extend its life.
- Resurfacing is the application of a layer of this mixed material of 40mm minimum thickness. It strengthens the road, seals it against the ingress of water, and improves skidding resistance and riding quality. The thicker the layer, the more strength imparted.
- Wearing course Bitumen Macadam (Bitmac) has an expected life of 7-12 years which can be
 extended by subsequent surface dressing. Bitmac is a more flexible material than Asphalt and
 more suitable for the deformation and movement associated with weaker underlying ground
 conditions.
- Asphalt resurfacing is more appropriate to more heavily trafficked roads and junctions on a more robust base. It is more expensive and has a longer expected life of 15-20 years.
- Resurfacing of existing roads can usually be carried out on top of the existing surface (overlay) but where drainage or kerb levels or bridge heights are restricted the existing surface may need to be scrapped off before the resurfacing takes place

Surface Dressing

This process involves spraying a bitumen emulsion binder onto the existing road surface, followed by a layer of stone chippings, which is then rolled. This seals the road preventing ingress of water thus extending the life expectancy of the road and also helps to improve the skid resistance on the surface

Micro Surfacing

This material is a cold applied bituminous material similar to slurry sealing with a relatively fast setting time. However it is designed for more demanding locations, uses larger aggregates with a high quality binder, and can be laid in two courses up to a total thickness of 20mm to allow limited surface re-shaping. Its main benefits, as with slurry sealing, are that it can be laid quickly with minimal preparatory work thereby reducing traffic disruption. It is suitable for busy urban roads and the new surface can be trafficked within 15 to 20 minutes.

Refurbishment

This is the laying of bituminous materials on roads as one layer over shorter lengths to provide an improved surface.

Drainage Works

The quick and effective drainage of surface water from the carriageway contributes significantly to the safety of the road. Improvement works carried out include the upgrading of the existing drainage facilities to ensure effective dispersal of surface water and prevent as far as possible the occurrence of standing water or flooding of the road. In many cases the provision of new drainage facilities have to be undertaken including the installation of road gullies, pipes and manholes.

Grass Cutting

Grass cutting is carried out for road safety reasons rather than for amenity purposes. Previous grass cutting policy allowed for routine cutting of 1 swathe width (approximately 1.2m) twice a year in rural areas and in urban areas, five times a year across the full verge width. However, last year due to financial constraints the policy was amended and only one cut was carried out across rural and urban areas, with the exception of sightlines which were re-cut as required. Due to continued financial constraint a similar policy will be implemented this year.

Gully Emptying

In previous years drainage gullies in urban areas were cleaned twice per year and in rural areas once per year. Open outlets were also cleaned once per year. However, due to financial constraints routine gully cleaning was only carried out once in all areas last year and due to further funding pressures a similar policy will be implemented this year.

Out of Office Assistance

We have a call centre to deal with calls outside normal office hours. Appropriate personnel can be called upon to deal with emergencies such as flooding on roads, obstructions such as fallen trees, and clearing up after road traffic accidents. The telephone number is 028 3752 9500

2.1 Completed Asphalt Resurfacing 2015/2016

Asphalt resurfacing is more appropriate to heavily trafficked roads and junctions. It can have a life expectancy of up to 20 years. During the past year we have carried out a range of complementary improvements to kerbing, drainage, and the like on asphalt schemes to enhance the value and quality of the work.

Across the Council area a total of approximately 51,000 sq metres of asphalt was laid during the 2015-16 financial year, including the following schemes:-

2.2 Completed Bitumen Macadam Resurfacing 2015/2016

This is a more flexible material than asphalt and is used on less busy rural roads. It is more suitable for the deformation and movement, which can be expected due to weaker underlying ground conditions. As with asphalt resurfacing, we carried out a range of other improvements to add value to the work.

Across the area a total of approximately 497,00 sq metres of bitumen macadam was laid during the 2015-16 financial year, including the following schemes:-

Surface Dressing is a surface treatment used to seal roads to prevent the ingress of water and restore the surface texture of the carriageway.

2.9 Network Maintenance - Winter Service 2015/2016

The aim of winter service is to help, as far as possible, main road traffic to move safely and freely in wintry conditions by spreading salt at the most effective times. It is vital that we cover as much traffic as possible for the available budget and criteria have been devised to identify the roads that would provide the best cost benefits.

Within Southern Division, a fleet of 40 gritting vehicles and over 140 personnel were available to salt approximately 2200 km of main roads. We aim to complete a salting action in just over 3 hours, which is an immense logistical exercise. There were 71 salting actions this year, at a cost of just under £25,000 per action; the first action being on 20 November 2015 and the last on 27 April 2016. Approximately 16,400 tonnes of salt was used. These figures do not include work carried out on the M1 and the A1 which are maintained by DBFO companies.

Because of the high costs involved, it is essential that our engineers take informed decisions and they are assisted in this task by Met Office staff and the very latest technology. There are currently 21 Transport NI maintained weather stations across Northern Ireland with an additional 4 stations maintained by the DBFO companies, and with further data provided from 10 sites in Southern Ireland

Information on our salting activities continues to be relayed electronically to the broadcast media to ensure that the latest news on road conditions is available to motorists across Northern Ireland. Additional information, including our winter service leaflet, can be found on our website along with advice on driving in poor weather conditions.

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3.1 Network Development Schemes Completed

Minor Works Schemes Completed 2015/2016

A3 Friary Road Armagh Newry Road junction, Armagh

This scheme to improve traffic progression and pedestrian facilities at this key junction was completed in July 2015. The scheme has had a significant positive impact on traffic progression in Armagh at this junction and the adjacent Mall West Gaol Square Barrack Street junction. This scheme was part funded by council and DSD.

C185 Artasooly Road Blackwatertown

This scheme involved the provision of approximately 150metres of Vehicle Restraint System and was completed in February 2016.

B7 Rathfriland Road at Dechomet Road Junction Moneyslane

A scheme to improve forward visibility and widen the carriageway at this location is complete.

B77 Loughgall Road at Kilmoriarity Hall

A scheme to widen the carriageway and improve the forward visibility was completed in March 2016

B78 Mullurg Road at A51 Hamiltonsbawn Road junction

A scheme to improve forward visibility on the approach to this junction was carried out in September 2015.

Collision Remedial Schemes Completed in 2015/16

A29 Keady Road Armagh at Ballyards

A scheme to realign the above road at Ballyards lodge was completed in July 2015. This scheme was carried out to improve upon the poor collision history at this location.

A29 Keady Road Armagh at Beechhill Crossroads

Following investigation of injury collision history at this location, a scheme to improve the superelevation and road width and also provide edge of carriageway marking and road studs was completed here in March 2016. The visibility at the side road junctions has also been improved and footway links to the bus shelter were provided.

Traffic Calming Schemes Completed 2015/16

Donaghcloney

This scheme included the provision of 15 road humps, 17 sets of speed cushions and a pedestrian refuge island. Work was completed by June 2015.

Banbridge Road, Kinallen

This scheme involved the provision of 3 sets of speed cushions, 4 road humps and a raised speed table, together with associated signage and road markings.

Work was completed by September 2015.

Drumbreda Estate, Armagh

This scheme involved the provision of 7 road humps, together with associated signage and road markings. This work was completed by November 2015.

Pedestrian and Cycling Measures Completed in 2015/16

Controlled Pedestrian Crossings

New controlled crossing facilities have also been provided at the following locations;

Barrack Hill, Armagh - A controlled Toucan pedestrian crossing has been installed on Barrack Hill, Armagh. A Toucan crossing is similar to a Puffin crossing only wider to accommodate its use by cyclists.

Work was completed in November 2015.

Traffic Management—Waiting Restrictions

William Street, High Street and North Street Lurgan

Following the implementation of the Council led Public Realm Scheme in Lurgan a number of new restrictions were provided. The restrictions in High Street, North Street and William Street are now operational.

Traffic Management—Speed Limits

B2 Dromore Road at Gamblestown

A 40mph speed limit has been provided on the B2 at Gamblestown. This became operational in July 2015

B28 Moy Road Portadown at Scotch Street Portadown

The existing 40mph speed limit at Scotch Street was replaced by a 30mph limit and became fully operational in January 2016.

Traffic Management—Traffic Orders

The experimental order which banned right turns from Carrickblacker Road and Lurgan Road at Edenderry, Portadown has now been made permanent. The temporary barriers will remain in place until work to provide new traffic islands, which is to be coordinated with the Council led linkages scheme, is completed.

Minor Works

Accessible Parking bay applications will be assessed before the completion of the necessary legislative process. Successful applications are required to be notified in local newspapers offering the opportunity for the general public to submit their views.

Any objections must be fully considered before the application can progress to the legislative stage

Because of the processes involved, approved applications are required to be grouped and processed in batches on two or maybe three occasions during the year.

Safer Routes to Schools

St Peters Primary School, Collegelands

Work to provide new part time 20mph speed limits at the school has commenced. The part time speed limits have been legislated however a delay in the provision of additional repeater signs means that work will be completed in June 2016.

Moyallen Primary School

Work to provide new part time 20mph speed limits at the school has commenced. The part time speed limits have been legislated however a delay in the provision of power supply and additional repeater signs means that work will be completed in June 2016

Waiting Restrictions

Brownlow Terrace Lurgan

The legislation is currently being made for new parking restrictions in Brownlow Terrace.

Park Road, Thomas Street and Wilson Street Portadown

Legislation to provided limited waiting in Thomas Street and Park Road as well as double yellow lines at Wilson Street is currently being legislated.

Union Street and Carnegie Street

As part of the current Public Realm scheme ongoing in Lurgan a number of changes to parking is proposed in Union Street and Carnegie Street. These will be forwarded to the Council in due course.

Newry Street Banbridge

It is proposed to implement limited waiting in the bus stops at Newry Street Banbridge which will no longer be required following completion of the bus facility in Banbridge.

Speed Limits

Following a speed limit review of the following areas, in line with current policy, and confirmation by the PSNI that they are content with the proposals, it is our intention to progress legislation for the introduction of a 30mph speed limit at the following locations.

Castlewellan Road Rathfriland

A 40mph speed limit is proposed on the lead in to the town on the above road.

Silverwood Road Lurgan

A proposal to implement a 50mph speed limit along Silverwood Road Lurgan is currently being legislated. This will also include the provision of a 40mph limit along the entire length of Kiln Road.

Moneyslane Road and Dromara Road Moneyslane

It is proposed to implement 30mph limits on the above roads. Full details will be forwarded to Council in due course.

Traffic Orders

Mill Avenue, Portadown

A proposal to prohibit u-turning on Northway between Mill Avenue and West Street has been advertised and no objections were received. The matter will now be referred to the Department for Infrastructure Committee for approval following which a commencement date will be advertised.

Friary Road Armagh

As part of the recent scheme at Friary Road a number of banned turns are being legislated. In addition a Loading Bay will be provided at the new mini-roundabout at Dobbin Street. These will become operational later in the summer.

Traffic Signs

We hope to continue our programme of replacing internally illuminated bollards with reflective bollards, thus helping to reduce energy costs

4.1 Development Control

Planning Applications

In carrying out their planning functions Councils have a duty to consult a range of statutory bodies. Transport NI on behalf of the Department for Regional Development (Department for Infrastructure from 9 May 2016) has entered into an agreement with each Council to provide views and advice on roads and transportation related issues.

Transport NI in its consideration of planning applications, takes into account aspects of development which could prejudice traffic progression and safety in terms of junction capacity, access arrangements, parking standards and provision, road width, radii, gradients, drainage and sight lines. A detailed Transport Assessment may be required for larger developments where potential traffic impact may extend to road junctions some distance from the development site and where infrastructure improvements are deemed necessary as mitigation.

In the case of housing developments, the Private Streets (NI) Order 1980 is applied if a planning application includes streets which are to become public and maintainable by the Department. Development Control/Private Streets Section determines the area to be adopted, arranges for the calculation of the bond amount, supervises construction of the streets and, following satisfactory completion by the developer, completes the process for adoption into the public road network. Should the developer not complete the streets, Transport NI can take appropriate enforcement action under the Private Streets Order to ensure satisfactory completion of works funded by the bond.

Other associated Development Control work includes participating in pre-application, planning meetings, presentation of evidence at Planning Appeals and the approval of accesses onto the public road under Article 80 of the Roads (NI) Order 1993. The Section also deals with responses to property certificate enquiries.

Article 80

Article 80 applies to new vehicular accesses on to unclassified roads or agricultural accesses on to classified and unclassified roads. It covers proposals such as new driveway entrances and dropped kerbs and is used where planning permission is not required.

4.2 Private Streets

Enforcement

Private Streets Section endeavours to work with developers to ensure that streets are brought up to an adoptable standard without delay. If the developer does not complete the street works or ceases trading and house building and occupancy is sufficiently advanced, then Transport NI will take enforcement action and appoint its own contractor, recovering the costs of works from the road bond under Article 13 and 15 of the Private Streets (NI) Order 1980. The Section also takes action against developers who fail in their responsibility to take out a bond.

New Housing Developments

In the 2015/2016 financial year, Southern Street Lighting Section accepted responsibility for 190 new street lights in the Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon Borough Council area on private housing developments constructed under the Private Streets (Construction)(Amendment) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2001

Street Lighting Maintenance

Budget constraints have meant that the Department has faced periods of significant street lighting resource pressures over the last two years. While budget pressures still exist this year, our initial allocation for street lighting maintenance allows us to continue using our external contractors to carry out street lighting repairs at this time. However, the continuation of this service for the full year will depend on the outcome of monitoring rounds

Since April 2015, TransportNI only repairs those defective street lights reported by citizens or their representatives. In order to facilitate this process, reports of defective lights can now be made directly on line via the NIDirect website at the web address:

<u>https://www.nidirect.gov.uk/services/report-street-light-fault</u>. Reports made via this web page automatically generate a works order to the appropriate contractor to have the defect repaired.

Reports can also be made by telephone at 0300 200 7899.

Priority is given to emergency defects ie those defects posing a direct structural or electrical hazard, then to groups of lights out, groups of lights burning continuously and finally to individual lights out.

LED Project

The pilot LED retrofit project in Banbridge and Craigavon areas is now substantially complete. A total of 15,164 new LED lanterns have been installed, at a cost of £3m. The savings in electricity and maintenance costs are not yet finalised, but are estimated to be over £400k per annum.

This has been a large scale project, and while the new lighting has been well received in many locations, it is also acknowledged that complaints about lighting levels and poor uniformity have been received. Each complaint has been carefully assessed and, where appropriate, adjustments have been made, or will be implemented in the near future to address the issues. However, for the majority of the complaints assessed to date, the new LED lighting has been found to meet the appropriate class in British Standard BS 5489, 'Code of Practice for the Design of Road Lighting'.

The project aimed to provide a better understanding and experience of key issues such as: procurement; design and selection of equipment; column surveys and testing; transition from mainly sodium (amber/pink) light sources to white light LEDs; and savings in energy and maintenance costs. The experience gained will help to inform future projects and to find the correct balance in delivering the right levels of street lighting for the public, while making the necessary cost savings
