

# Inner North Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership ANNUAL REPORT – 2015/16

#### **About Neighbourhood Renewal**

The Neighbourhood Renewal Programme aims to reduce the social and economic inequalities which characterise the most deprived areas. It does so by making a long term commitment to communities to work in partnership with them to identify and prioritise needs and co-ordinate interventions designed to address the underlying causes of poverty. Neighbourhood Renewal Partnerships were established with representatives of local community interests together with appropriate Government Departments, public sector agencies, private sector interest and local elected representatives. The socio economic statistics demonstrate some of the principal challenges facing the Inner North area; reflecting high levels of unemployment, low educational attainment, community health issues and the challenges facing young people in the area and lack of facilities available.

#### **About Inner North Neighbourhood Partnership**

The Inner North Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership emerged in late 2004 through informal meetings between representatives of Greater New Lodge Community Empowerment Partnership and Lower North Belfast Community Council. The Neighbourhood Partnership initially comprised of four representatives from each group. Representatives from the Northern Ireland Housing Executive and North and West Belfast Health and Social Services Trust also became members. The original community balance, established at the end of 2004, was supplemented in April 2006 by a representative from Mount Vernon when this neighbourhood was added to the neighbourhood renewal area (NRA) by DSD.

Inner North Belfast NRA comprises mostly of Duncairn and New Lodge wards, and includes Carrick Hill, Newington, Duncairn, New Lodge, Mountcollyer, Gainsborough, Grove, Northwood, Mountvernon and Shore Crescent. A number of main arterial routes run through the area and the M2 motorway acts as one of its boundaries.

The Partnership now consists of a range of community and voluntary sector partners from across New Lodge, Carrick Hill, Tigers Bay, Shore Road and Mount Vernon, and is complemented by the North Belfast Partnership Board, Belfast City Council, NIHE, and the Belfast Health and Social Care Trust. It is committed to delivering sustained improvement in Inner North Neighbourhoods as initially reflected in its 2006 Vision Framework and Action Plan.

The Partnership established 4 sub-groups to assist in the identification, development and where appropriate the delivery of projects which aim to address the Programmes 4 strategic objectives of Community Renewal, Social Renewal, Economic Renewal and Physical Renewal. They also assist local community organisations to coordinate actions that are beneficial for all communities living in the Inner North Neighbourhood Renewal Area (NRA).

With the development of the first neighbourhood Action Plan in 2007 all members of the sub-groups involved in delivering Neighbourhood Renewal had a seat at the Partnership. After a review in 2009 it was agreed that the Partnership move to establish a smaller more focused Partnership Management Committee that would provide overall direction to the work of the Partnership.

Each subgroup would then nominate at least one member to sit on the main Partnership Management Committee. Each sub group was to appoint a chairperson and a co-chair and engage with the appropriate statutory representatives to ensure representation on the subgroup.

#### The aims of the sub groups are:

- > To influence statutory agencies to focus their investments and resources on the delivery of public services where they will have most impact on improving the well-being and quality of life for those living and working in Inner North.
- > To engage in effective working partnerships with key stakeholders from all relevant sectors to proactively deliver the identified priorities detailed in the Neighbourhood Action Plan.
- > To maintain a Neighbourhood Partnership and related sub group structures that are representative of local regeneration stakeholders that will lead, coordinate and monitor implementation of the Neighbourhood Action Plan.

## North Belfast Neighbourhood Partnership Chairs Forum

Inner North Neighbourhood Partnership is one of a number Neighbourhood Renewal Partnerships throughout North Belfast. The others are:

- Ballysillan and Upper Ardoyne Neighbourhood Partnership
- Crumlin / Ardoyne Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership
- Ligoniel Neighbourhood Partnership
- Rathcoole Neighbourhood Partnership

The North Belfast Neighbourhood Partnership Chairs meet bi-monthly to collaborate on their neighbourhood renewal work across North Belfast's most disadvantaged communities. The Chairs' Forum, which is facilitated by North Belfast Partnership and BRO, is a valuable mechanism for promoting the work of community organisations delivering Neighbourhood Renewal. The Forum also acts as a conduit for

collective responses from Neighbourhood Renewal Partnerships to consultations, policy issues and potential collaborative funding opportunities.

#### **The North Belfast Economic Forum**

Chairs from the five North Belfast Neighbourhood Renewal Partnerships along with representatives from North Belfast Partnership and Belfast Regeneration Office agreed to establish an Economic Forum to work collectively for North Belfast to boost economic regeneration locally. This grouping is called the North Belfast Economic Forum and has a remit to work collaboratively with local training and employment organisations, government departments, statutory organisations and private sector employers to promote increased economic regeneration, prosperity and investment for North Belfast.

Representatives from the community and voluntary sector and government departments includes DSD, DEL, North City Business Centre, Ashton Community Trust and the Women's TEC. In 2014 the Forum received a boost when Patricia O'Hagan MBE, Chief Executive of Core Systems NI Ltd, agreed to adopt the role of 'Champion' for North Belfast and is currently assisting the Forum to promote the area as a good place to invest. Other progress made included organising a North Belfast Economic Summit in 2015 which was followed up with a publication that complement findings from the event.

It is anticipated that the Forum will act as a driver for economic regeneration across North Belfast to bring much needed investment and resources into the area across multiple fronts including job creation, inward investment and maximising the effect of local large scale regeneration projects

#### The North Belfast Health Forum

The North Belfast Health & Social Wellbeing Forum has been in existence from 1999 when North Belfast Partnership facilitated the coming together of interested individuals & groups to develop a cross-community partnership approach to addressing issues of health & social well-being throughout north Belfast.

The Forum provides a platform to discuss health issues impacting north Belfast and prioritise areas of work which need to be addressed: members include representatives from across the community, voluntary and statutory sectors working in the field of health & wellbeing with the overarching aim of reducing life inequalities throughout the locality.

## **Inner North Neighbourhood Renewal Funded Projects**

The Neighbourhood Renewal Investment Fund is currently supporting seven projects within the Neighbourhood Renewal Area.

## **Community Renewal/Social Renewal**

#### 1. Ashton Community Trust – Kinderkids Daycare

The project objectives are to deliver a high quality, affordable, accessible childcare service to local people in some of the most deprived areas in north Belfast. Through its three facilities Kinderkids provides childcare to over 200 children in the 0-12 age group.

- over 150 parents and guardians able to access training, employment and educational opportunities;
- providing childcare training placements to people from local schools and training providers; and
- hosting visits from the ambulance and fire services as part of the 'People Who Help Us' element of the curriculum.

#### 2. 174 Trust - Afterschools

The project provides a secure and shared venue for children, aged 5-11 years, from the Greater New Lodge and surrounding areas, for play, social interaction and other activities putting children first. It sustains 18 places in afterschool playcare provision at an affordable cost. Additionally the project facilitates parents who are in work or training as well as families in need of respite care. This is an inclusive project and at present one third of its children have additional needs and staff are required to work on a 1:1 basis with children experiencing social and emotional difficulties as well as children with learning and physical difficulties.

Activities this year have included

- placements for childcare trainees; and
- hosting a very successful summer scheme

#### 3. Carrick Hill Residents Association - Community Development and Relations

The project aims to support, develop and implement programmes of activities in order to build positive and effective relationships with local people and statutory agencies. The project promotes community involvement in Carrick Hill and has already built up good working relationships with statutory agencies to address issues around housing, environment, education and society.

- Collaborating with the NOW project to provide training support to young people;
- Summer schemes and summer intervention programmes for young people;
- After school homework club;
- Healthy living programmes including Pilates, boccia, involvement in Older People's Health Programme with New Lodge/Duncairn Community Health Partnership; and
- Lobbying for improved road safety and resolution of parking problems in the area.



### 4. Arts for All - Community Development and Relations through the arts

The project delivers a programme of activities which will develop the community and build its capacity through the medium of arts in north Belfast. The programme has been devised to improve skills, build confidence and compliment formal education whilst encouraging local people to express themselves in a creative and positive ways.

- theatre and DJing workshops for young people;
- music workshops with local schools;
- an inter-cultural programme involving people from Irish, Colombian, English, Kurdish and Indian backgrounds; and
- the continuation of the cross-community Port and Docks of Belfast textile project

## 5. Star Neighbourhood Centre - Community Development and Relations

The Star Neighbourhood Centre provides a range of services, programmes and facilities for the local New Lodge community. The project's principle aim is to improve the quality of life of local residents by providing much needed services to the 'Long Streets' area of the New Lodge. This project will attempt to tackle social exclusion by promoting community development which will in turn build confidence, self-esteem and capacity of local people to participate in neighbourhood regeneration.

- Cross community events for older people at Christmas and Easter;
- Continuation of "Little Stars" childcare/afterschool facility that enables parents/guardians to access employment and training and provides placements to trainees;
- Provision of accredited OCN qualifications including Law and Order, youth work and peer leadership; and
- Young people involved in cultural awareness programmes, Street Games project, visits to Berlin as part of OCN work and cross community residentials.

# 6. Mount Vernon Community Development Forum / Loughview Community Action Partnership - Community Development and Relations

The Forum and Partnership is an umbrella group that seeks to address social and economic issues for residents from White City to Tigers Bay. They work collaboratively with other groups to address these social and economic issues within the Inner North Neighbourhood area including Ashton Community Trust, Northern Ireland Alternatives, Good Morning Belfast, Sure start and the CLARE project.

- Volunteers working with the CLARE project to help combat social isolation amongst older people;
- Development of LCAP interagency community safety group involving PSNI, NIHE and BCC;
- Diversionary programmes for young people at risk of anti social behaviour; and
- Health events at Loughside Recreation Centre and Alexander Church Halls

#### The Inner Youth Platform

The Inner North Youth Platform is made up of young people from the New Lodge and Mount Vernon estates. They have taken part in a range of accredited qualifications, training, teambuilding days and planning residentials, as well as facilitating their own 'Identifying Community Needs' consultation for young people. The young people have completed Governance training and participated in 2 residentials in the last year, one teambuilding/fun and one to plan for their consultation evening with young people to identify community needs'. The group have also had 3 teambuilding days with Journey free, which have helped the group to have fun, build confidence and grow as a strong group that can represent their peers and their communities.

## Young Women's Football Training Programme and Older Peoples Activities – projects lead by one sub group.

Inner North Neighbourhood Partnership, received an Active Award from Sport NI award of £8,706 to run a series of young girls (7-14 year olds) football sessions across the inner North Belfast. The purpose of the programme was to get more young girls involved in taking regular exercise through good quality football coaching. Community organisations that participated in the initiative were the Star Neighbourhood Centre, New Lodge Youth Club, Kinderkids and the Duncairn Community Centre. Each participating organisation received six free coaching sessions as well as free transport to and from venues. The project ran from the end of September and ended with a Christmas celebration event in December 2015, with 45 young girls taking part and the majority expressing their interest in continuing.

In Partnership with the New Lodge Duncairn Community Health Partnership, the project also targeted older people encouraging participation in exercise related activities such as hill walking, yoga and Boccia, which in all engaged 20 older individuals in these activities.

## 7. Ashton Community Trust – Skills and Employment

There are 2 elements to this project namely Community ICT and Community Access to Lifelong Learning. A wide range of programmes are on offer including; essential skills, adult literacy and numeracy, an entrance strategy into the world of education, a social means of communication through ICT and a drop in facility as well as outreach when possible. This training helps participants progress to further education, training or into employment.

- Participants achieving accredited qualifications in essential skills, communication, literacy and numeracy and ICT
- A number of residents obtaining employment following participation in the training

#### **Inner North Neighbourhood Partnership Conclusion**

In the 2015/16 financial year, Inner North Neighbourhood Partnership total overall spend was £453,619.37

#### There are 3 key future developments in the Inner North Neighbourhood Renewal Area as detailed below:

#### **Ulster University Greater Belfast Development**

This development is the most significant regeneration project in the Northside of Belfast for a generation. It holds the potential for significant economic and social development for a part of the city which suffered badly during the years of unrest. This is a significant £250 million development, built around the existing campus in York Street. The construction will take place in two stages and it is hoped to have the full campus opened by September 2018. The university acknowledges there will be challenges ahead in ensuring Belfast has the right infrastructure in place for a development of this scale. They are working in partnership with Belfast City Council and a number of government departments including DSD to ensure that concerns around student housing, car parking and public transport, public realm and community benefit are addressed. The University has engaged with the Inner North Neighbourhood Partnership and the local community to address a range of issues.

#### York Street Interchange

Transport NI and DRD have developed proposals, estimated at a cost of £120m - £165m, to provide a grade-separated junction at York Street that would provide direct links between Westlink, the M2 and M3 motorways and greatly improve access between these roads. Plans to improve the York Street Interchange with Westlink are included in Department's Investment Delivery Plan for Roads. Proposed plans have raised concerns for residents particularly residing within the New Lodge and Carrick Hill area. Alternative plans were submitted

to the Department and Translink NI and presented at a public inquiry. On 20 October 2016 the Department for Infrastructure announced that this project was at risk due to uncertainty about potential EU funding following the decision to leave the European Union.

#### **Building Successful Communities**

Neighbourhood decline can be viewed as being fuelled by a combination of factors, including social and economic change. Factors affecting areas include: mass joblessness as a result of recession and the decline of old manufacturing industries; and rising skill demands in new industries affecting future employment prospects. At the same time these areas have seen more family breakdown with the majority of lone parents reliant on benefits, a decline in popularity of social housing areas and increasing concentrations of vulnerable people in poor neighbourhoods; coupled with an increasing availability of drugs and the growth of the drug economy. If the income of an area goes down, it is less likely to be able to sustain shops and banks, but has more need of access to credit and good value shops and if people start to leave an area, higher turnover can destabilise communities. If properties are not filled, desertion creates a deteriorating physical environment and more opportunity for crime.

In DSD currently, housing and regeneration programmes are largely delivered in isolation. Regeneration programmes focus mainly on town and city centres and arterial routes and largely ignore the needs of adjacent communities. Social housing development is primarily delivered in areas on the fringes of town and city centres and is delivered in isolation of regeneration policies and programmes. Also, the Neighbourhood Renewal programme<sup>2</sup>, the NI Executive's main programme to tackle deprivation and disadvantage, which aims to tackle disadvantage and deprivation in all aspects of everyday life through programmes targeting economic, community social and physical renewal has had some impact on health and education indicators within disadvantaged communities but has largely excluded housing development and improvement within target areas.

This approach does not recognise the potential for economies of scale and greater return on investment which could potentially be generated from collaborative working.

The Programme for Government (PFG) 2011-15 stated that the primary focus of the Executive is to grow the economy and tackle disadvantage. Some of the stated measures for achieving this objective area to:


- Support people (with an emphasis on young people) into employment by providing skills and training;
- Contribute to rising levels of employment by supporting the promotion of over 25,000 new jobs; and
- Improve community safety by tackling anti-social behaviour.

Building Successful Communities will meet the strategic aims of the Executive by providing greater opportunities to access social homes and will decrease levels of homelessness and housing stress; primarily through the development of housing in areas of lower housing demand, and also through the redesign of areas of high demand to enable greater development.

It will also offer training and employment opportunities to people living within social housing estates to ensure that they are supported into employment and given the necessary skills and qualifications to actively contribute to the economy. Furthermore, it will deliver programmes to improve street and road layouts to design out crime, and support community led initiatives to reduce crime and the fear of crime.

The agreed overarching objective for the project is to test a housing led regeneration approach in 4 areas which are experiencing blight, dereliction and decline in partnership with local communities and key statutory and voluntary and community sector organisations, e.g. NIHE, Housing Associations, DEL and PSNI. Tigers Bay / Mountcollyer in the Inner North NRA has been selected as one of the 4 pilot areas, Objectives within each of these areas are to:

- Improve current housing and infrastructure;
- Deliver new social and affordable homes;
- Deliver environmental upgrading works;
- · Improve access to amenities; and
- Improve access to economic activity.
   Following resident surveys and public exhibitions, the Tigers Bay and Mountcollyers action plan is in the final stages of agreement.
