About Neighbourhood Renewal (NR)

In June 2003 the Department launched the Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy 'People and Place. This long term strategy seeks to target those communities throughout Northern Ireland who are suffering from higher than average rates of unemployment, ill health and crime, lower levels of educational attainment and higher rates of income deprivation. It does so by making a long term commitment to communities to work in partnership with them to identify and prioritise needs and co-ordinate interventions designed to address the underlying causes of poverty and close the gap between the quality of life for people living in the most deprived neighbourhoods in Northern Ireland and the rest of society. The Neighbourhood Renewal Programme aims to reduce the social and economic inequalities which characterise these areas of deprivation and decline.

The Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy has four interlinking strategic objectives under the following themes:

Community Renewal – to develop confident communities that are able and committed to improving the quality of life in their areas.

Economic Renewal – to develop economic activity in the most deprived neighbourhoods and connect them to the wider urban economy.

Social Renewal – to improve social conditions for the people who live in the most deprived neighbourhoods through better co-ordinated public services and the creation of safer environments.


Physical Renewal – to help create attractive, safe and sustainable environments in the most deprived neighbourhoods.

North West Development Office (NWDO) is responsible for the delivery of the Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy in Londonderry and the neighbouring towns of Limavady and Strabane. It produced an implementation plan which set out the Department's approach to the selection of the Neighbourhood Renewal areas and the establishment of delivery structures in the City and neighbouring towns. The Neighbourhood Renewal Areas were identified as those within the top 10% most deprived areas according to the Noble Multiple Deprivation Measures. Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership Boards were set up in each Neighbourhood Renewal Area i.e. 4 across Londonderry, Strabane and Limavady to manage the delivery of the Neighbourhood

Renewal Programme. The Neighbourhood Partnership Boards took the lead in the process of drawing up the Neighbourhood Vision Framework and Neighbourhood Action Plans for their Neighbourhood Renewal areas. Following a local consultation process Neighbourhood Action Plans were developed which identified priority issues and actions required meeting the specific needs of local neighbourhoods and achieving the Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership Board's vision for their respective area.

About Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area

The Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area broadly covers the five main housing estates of Ballycolman, Carlton Drive, Lisnafin Park, Barrack Street, Springhill Park, Fountain Street, Innisfree Gardens, Drumrallagh and the Town Centre. A map of the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area (NRA) is shown below.



At the last Census (2011) there were 2,430 households and 5,583 people living within the boundaries of the Neighbourhood Renewal Area. There were 6% of residents who identified themselves as having a 'Protestant and Other Christian (including

Christian related) community background', while approximately 93% identify themselves as having a Catholic community background. Approximately 64% of the population is of working age.

This Neighbourhood suffers high levels of unemployment since the decline of the textile and agricultural industries. There is multiple deprivation with higher levels of crime, anti-social behaviour, benefit dependency and lower levels of educational attainment. Benefit uptake in Strabane NRA is currently considerably higher than Non NRAs and also has among the highest percentage of benefit claimants among all other NRAs. Although there has been positive change in Strabane NRA for the percentage achieving 5 or more GCSEs, (where the percentage has almost doubled since 2004/05), the rate for Strabane NRA remains lower than Non NRAs.

The town centre has seen a reduction in footfall and economic activity as a result of shop closures and retailers moving out of the town centre to edge of town retail parks. There are a number of vacant and derelict properties that have also diminished the town's place quality and economic and social character. Historically there are community divisions within the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area.

About Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership

Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership was established in 2005 to take forward the Neighbourhood Renewal Programme and oversee the development and delivery of the Neighbourhood Renewal Action Plan, with the vision that '*Strabane will be physically attractive and economically prosperous, with strong, well-led communities that work together for lasting change. Public services will be accessible and responsive to need. Local neighbourhoods will be safe, attractive places where people want to live. Opportunities will be available to build a healthier community and a positive future for our children and young people*'. The Partnership is defined as non-constituted entity acting in an advisory role to the Department for Neighbourhood Renewal issues in the designated Neighbourhood Renewal area. Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership currently comprises of 23 members who include representatives from local voluntary and community organisations, elected representatives, other government departments and local statutory organisations. It currently meets on a six weekly basis. A Neighbourhood Renewal Officer and Part-time Administrator provide the administrative services to the Partnership.

Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership has established 4 Action Teams and a number of sub/working groups to assist it in the identification, development and where appropriate the delivery of projects which aim to address the Programmes four strategic objectives of community renewal, social renewal, economic renewal and physical renewal. The Partnership and Subgroup members

have all signed up to and abide by the Neighbourhood Renewal Code of Practice and Guiding Principles and subsequent Subgroup Terms of Reference.

Roles and Responsibilities

Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Objectives

The objectives of the Partnership are to manage, develop and oversee the regeneration of Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area to:

- Ensure that people living in the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area have access to the best possible services and to opportunities which make for a better quality of life, better prospects and the creation of a safer environment for themselves and their families.
- Develop economic activity in the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area and connect the community to the wider economy of Strabane and Northern Ireland.
- Develop confident communities that are able and committed to improving the quality of life in the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area.
- Improve the environment and image of the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area so that it becomes an attractive place to live and invest in.

The Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership is responsible for:

- Analysing and prioritising the needs of the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area.
- Engaging with and consulting local communities to drive and implement Neighbourhood Renewal.
- Leading the process in the preparation of the Neighbourhood Renewal Action Plan
- Overseeing the implementation of the Neighbourhood Renewal Action Plan.
- Reviewing the Action plan annually to ensure that it reflects the priority needs in the area.
- Monitoring and evaluating progress against the priorities in the action plan quarterly.
- Publicising and building awareness of Neighbourhood Renewal by informing and updating local communities of progress made on a regular basis.
- Facilitating and securing agreement between local service providers on integrated working in the Neighbourhood Renewal Area.
- Taking decisions on individual projects and activities to be undertaken in the Neighbourhood Renewal Area.
- Establishing systems to monitor the overall progress and impact of Neighbourhood Renewal in the area and providing monitoring reports to the Department.

The Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership has established 4 Sub/Working Groups to address the priorities under the themes Community Renewal, Social Renewal – Crime & Anti-Social Behaviour, Education, Health, Economic Renewal – Worklessness, Social Economy and Physical Renewal.

Education Steering Group

This group was established to develop programmes/initiatives that help to improve children's educational/life outcomes. The Group brings together the community and voluntary sector, schools, Strabane Family Centre (Barnardo's NI) and Strabane Surestart. The sub-group has been very successful at helping to increase collaboration between schools, community groups and other support services. During 2018/19 the sub-group partners continued to focus their efforts on the delivery of resilience programmes to help deal with the growing problem of child mental health distress.

Barnardo's NI, with support from the Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership, organised and delivered a series of '*Strabane Connect, Why People Need People*' workshops for schools and community groups to raise awareness of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and embed trauma informed practice in local organisations/services. This training was designed to equip twenty participants with:

- An understanding of the factors that contribute to toxic stress and its impact on mental health
- The part that workers and volunteers can play in building resilience by integrating very simple and practical actions into their existing services
- Booklets and post workshop online training and resources

Further to the training, participants also took part in technical assistance sessions to reflect on the training and how the learning could be embedded in their everyday work. This training is part of a process to establish a community resilience strategy for

Strabane through creating a common knowledge and language around trauma, resilience and hope.

The NR Learning Mentor from Holy Cross College, in partnership with Surestart and St Catherine's PS and St Mary's PS, designed and delivered a bespoke resilience programme to the parents of children attending nursery school. The programme was based on the 'Schools for Hope' (SfH) Programme and also incorporated the best elements of other programmes run by Surestart and schools. SfH is a mental health and well-being awareness programme based on research that suggests hope is a teachable skill. It aims to equip children and young people, their educators and parents with the tools they need to find and maintain hope even during the most trying of times.

Neighbourhood Health Improvement Working Group

This Group also functions as part of the Social Renewal Action Team and is primarily responsible for the implementation of the Neighbourhood Health Improvement Project (NHIP).

In 2018/19, almost five hundred residents from Strabane NRA participated in NHIP programmes designed to help people:

- Become more physically active
- Lose weight and maintain an overall healthy diet
- Promote good mental health
- Work in partnership to improve health & well-being

The Health Needs Analysis undertaken by Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership points to a desire for a one stop shop/hub which would actively seek to promote health assets and provide access to a wide range of health content and services. The core purpose of the proposed Health Improvement Hub would be to make it easier for people to live a healthy life and to support them to make meaningful lifestyle changes towards better health. At this point in time the preferred option is a community hub building which is perceived to be the best way to bring people/organisations together and help form new relationships and support networks. The Hub steering group is currently working to bring forward the following actions:

- Map community assets on an ongoing basis;
- Develop/explore asset based approaches such as Co-production, Social Prescribing, Community Health Champions;
- Work closely with organisations which specialise in the delivery of GP social prescribing schemes;
- Undertake options appraisal and produce business case for 'one stop' health & well-being hub;
- Establish a 'strategic' health forum to implement, deliver and report on the above actions (and other actions identified in the Strabane Local Community Plan).

Physical Renewal Working Group

The Physical Renewal Action Team is made up of representatives from the Northern Ireland Housing Executive (NIHE), Department for Communities (DfC), and the Community & Voluntary Sector. During the 2018/19 year the Action Team liaised with local community groups, Transport NI, DfC and DCSDC to bring forward a number of physical renewal projects including:

- A modular Community Health Building located at the allotments site of Strabane Health Improvement Project (*construction works now complete*)
- Environmental improvement works to roadways, footpaths and street lighting in Lisnafin Park, Magirr Park, Orchard St, St John's Place and Townsend St (*subject to confirmation of funding*)

The South West College's *Going Places* Programme and Strabane Unemployed Centre continued to be the two key Neighbourhood Renewal 'employability' interventions during 2018/19. A number of other Neighbourhood Renewal funded groups also drew in additional resources from a range of European Social Fund (ESF) programmes e.g. Strabane Community Project is the partner hub in Strabane for delivery of Skills North West which addresses personal barriers to employment, education and training, including social and economic circumstances affecting employment opportunities.

The NR Social Economy Working Group continued to focus its efforts on developing a pilot social enterprise project involving the use of Community Asset Transfer and social clauses in public procurement contracts. Strabane District Caring Services, Strabane Community Project and Strabane Health Improvement Project agreed to establish a jointly owned Community Maintenance social enterprise that will provide an affordable professional maintenance service in homes, gardens and community spaces. The partners commissioned a scoping study to assess the market for and viability of the joint venture social economy business. The scoping study concluded there appears to be a gap in the market for an area improvement service/handyman service in the Strabane and district area. Partner organisations intend to move forward with setting up a joint venture social enterprise subject to finalising an agreed business model and pricing model.

Community Planning

During 2018/19, Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership (NRP) continued to liaise with Derry City and Strabane District Council about co-designing/implementing community planning arrangements in Strabane. This involved the NR Partnership agreeing to undertake a dual role mandate to deliver both the Strabane Neighbourhood Action Plan and Local Growth Plan and taking steps to recruit/appoint additional members for delivery of the latter. With effect from April 2019 Strabane NR Partnership will commence delivery of the Local Growth (Community) Plan for Strabane Town.

Events Management Sub-group

This group was established to bring forward a community led programme of Christmas events involving local community groups, DCSDC Council and private sector bodies such as Strabane Chamber of Commerce and Strabane BID (Business Improvement District) Co.

The key purpose of 'Strabane Christmas Fayre' is to help build closer working relationships between the local community/ private sectors and Council; bring a strong sense of celebration and community spirit to Strabane; provide an outlet for local production and crafts and opportunities for local entrepreneurs/businesses.

The event featured over thirty local food and craft market stalls, as well as festive entertainment by local arts groups, musicians, brass bands and school choirs. Other highlights included a Nordic Tepee, 'Express' vintage bus with storytellers and 'Pooch Parade' Christmas jumper competition.

An estimated fifteen hundred people attended the event on 2nd December 2018 (down on previous year's figure of three thousand due to bad weather).

Strabane Shared Space Consortium

With support from Strabane NR Partnership and the Good Relations Team from Derry City & Strabane District Council, a consortium of community groups from Strabane, Lifford, Ballymagorry, Bready, Donemana and Derry City were awarded a £50,000 tender to deliver a Peace IV Shared Space Programme in Strabane & surrounding area. The programme will engage fifty participants over two years and will involve the strengthening and building of relations within the consortium, a history/tourism project to develop a trail of local cemeteries, a women's peacebuilding programme and a music programme engaging young people from all backgrounds.

3. Melmount East Bank Estates Community Association Forum – Uniting Neighbourhood Renewal Communities

Melmount East Bank Estates Community Associations Forum represents a number of community groups with unpaid staff based in the Ballycolman Estate and surrounding area. The Forum works closely with other organisations to help residents to access services and facilities such as the Community Allotment Project, Flexicare and community safety initiatives. 
6. Derry City & Strabane District Council – Technical Assistance

Derry City & Strabane District Council provides technical assistance support to Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership. In order to enable Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership to implement its Vision Framework and Action Plan, Derry City and Strabane District Council facilitates and co-ordinates:

- Analysing and prioritising the needs of the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area.
- Engaging with and consulting local communities to drive and implement Neighbourhood Renewal.
- Leading the process in the preparation of an action plan.
- Overseeing the implementation of the action plan.
- Reviewing the action plan annually to ensure that it reflects the priority needs in the area.
- Monitoring and evaluating progress against the priorities in the action plan quarterly.
- Publicising and building awareness of Neighbourhood Renewal by informing and updating local communities of progress made on a regular basis.

The Technical Support project facilitates action teams and associated working groups around the Community, Economic, Social and Physical Renewal objectives of the Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy.

These sub-groups are the “action arm” of the Partnership and are responsible for developing, planning, monitoring and reviewing specific themes or projects. Membership of each action team is drawn from the Partnership and external advisors on the basis of their expertise and knowledge being relevant to the overall strategic objective under which the action team was established.



Social Renewal - Health

7. HURT (Have your Tomorrows) – Support and Treatment Programmes for those Marginalised through Drugs and Alcohol

HURT is a drug and alcohol family support group that provides opportunities for those individuals and their family members, marginalised as a result of alcohol and drug use, to help them reintegrate within home, community and employment life. HURT provides holistic services through a tailored care plan designed to meet the needs of the individual. It offers the following services:

- Operates an open referral system and works closely with relevant Statutory Body and Voluntary Sector
- Following initial assessment provides a tailored care plan that meets individual needs
- Provides counselling, a range of complementary therapies to individuals and family members affected by addiction.
- Delivers Drugs and Alcohol Workshops and Programmes to youth groups, local schools and communities.

8. Strabane Sigerson's GAA – Project Co-ordinator delivering for a better Ballycolman

Strabane Sigersons GAA designs and facilitates the delivery of social, health and education programmes addressing the inequalities in health and improving the health and well-being of local people along with the delivery of appropriate programmes and courses aimed at empowering local people and extending the impact throughout the community. 9. The Koram Centre – The Provision of Counselling, Psychotherapy and Psycho-Social Support to Beneficiaries of the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area

This project provides funding towards a Manager/Cognitive Behavioural Therapist/Researcher, Part-time Clerical Officer, running and programme costs to deliver a professional counselling and psychotherapy service.

The Koram Centre offers therapeutic interventions that include individual treatment plans for depression, anxiety, suicidal ideation, agoraphobia, trauma – physical and sexual, obsessive compulsive disorder, and bereavement, anger and relationship difficulties. It provides couples therapy, family therapy, learning disability counselling and child counselling.

The Koram Centre works closely with the Western Health & Social Care Trust (WHSCT) – Public Health Agency and receives referrals through the local health centre and social services.


10. Western Health & Social Services Board – Neighbourhood Health Improvement Project

11. Derry City & Strabane District Council – Neighbourhood Renewal Active Citizenship through Sport

The project involves the delivery of a range of accredited sports and generic coaching courses that allow people to access training provision that will add value to new or existing coaching, physical activity and exercise programmes within the five local NRA's, i.e. Triax, Outer West, Outer North, Waterside and Strabane. The programme delivers targeted exercise, health and sporting physical activity programmes that address the key themes presented in the Neighbourhood Action Plans.

In Strabane NRA physical programmes such as swimming for the disabled, fitness classes and nutrition advice, Cardio Fit, Box Exercise, Bowling, Dance, Kayaking, Archery and Yoga are delivered through the following organisations/community groups:

Social Renewal – Education

12. Holy Cross College – Strabane Educational Support Programme

Holy Cross College, in partnership with Strabane Academy delivers this programme that targets pupils who are disengaged from the current education system providing academic and pastoral support. A Learning Mentor works with pupils on an individual basis and assists them to remain engaged with mainstream education. Pupils are offered a tailored education support and personal development plan to meet individual needs. The Learning Mentor supports each young person in academic and vocational courses that are not available at local schools and improves their opportunities for employment, training or employment.



13. Education Authority – Youth Engagement Plus (Strabane)

This Youth Led Programme was developed in response to an identified need for youth intervention programmes to tackle issues of low educational attainment, underage drinking, anti-social behaviour and lack of facilities for young people living in the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal area who are disengaged from the current education and youth services.

The programme provides leadership training and peer mentoring which includes pathways to qualifications/accreditation leaving a lasting legacy of new community leaders across the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal area. The key drivers of the programme are the Neighbourhood Renewal Youth Forum made up of 18 young people aged 16-25 years. Two Drop in Centres have been established within Community Centres in Ballycolman and Lisnafin estates to engage young people on a weekly basis in various accredited and non-accredited personal development programmes with support from an area youth worker. During the summer months young people engage in the Summer Youth Intervention Programme during periods of social unrest/heightened tensions to reduce incidents of anti-social behaviour. Young people are involved in a number of programmes that address community relations, health issues, promote active citizenship and volunteering to build community capacity and cohesion within local neighbourhoods.



Economic Renewal

14. South West College – Going Places Programme in the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area

The project involves a targeted training programme for the unemployed and young people who are no longer in education. The programme also includes the provision of a mentor who will support participants both during and after their training. During 2018/19 forty residents participated on the programme, fourteen of whom moved into employment. The Programme is delivered in three phases annually.

Phase 1

Engages residents in accredited training; participants are unemployed and not participating in education, training or employment at point of entry.

Phase 2

Provides progression from Phase 1 and offers an opportunity for 24 residents to obtain a driving licence via access to 18 driving lessons and two funded attempts at the driving test. Residents are also provided with directed training in preparation to sit the Driving Theory Test; the Programme provides for two attempts at theory test. All participants have access to accredited employability training in the Health & Social Care and Customer Services sectors and Basic First Aid during this phase. A four-week work placement is completed by participants at the conclusion of phase 2.

Phase 3

Phase 3 provides participants who have fully engaged with the programme during Phases 1 and 2 the opportunity to undertake specialist education or training including:

- Specialist Driving (LGV, HGV, PSV and Fork Lift Truck)
- SIA (Security Industry Authority) Licence



15. Derry City & Strabane District Council – Generalist Voluntary Advice Services

DfC Neighbourhood Renewal funding is awarded to Derry City & Strabane District Council which has a service level agreement with Advice North West to deliver advice services within the Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area. This project specifically targets local residents in receipt of social security benefits to ensure they are encouraged and supported to take up their full entitlement and that the process of seeking advice on a wide range of benefit and other issues is made more accessible. The Generalist Adviser provides advice and support as follows:

- Provides individual assessment of Social Security benefits to ensure that individuals living in Neighbourhood Renewal areas receive maximum income
- Advice on passport benefits – road tax, free school meals, prescriptions, blue and white badges, medical treatment
- Advice on consumer rights, employment, housing issues
- Outreach centre based in housing estates
- Debt management
- Ongoing changes to Welfare Reform (Universal Credit) and Tribunal Advocacy

16. Strabane Community Unemployed Group – Salary Costs – F/T Co-ordinator

This project provides funding toward the employment of a Project Co-ordinator to work within communities to help people who are unemployed, in particular long term unemployed and people suffering from long term health problems, to overcome barriers to learning that prevent them moving into employment. Through partnership working with the North West Regional College, the organisation delivers a number of formal education courses from the Unemployed Centre.



17. Strabane Health Improvement Project CIC – Construction of Modular Community Health Building

Construction works commenced in January 2019 on a new community health building located at the Ballycolman allotment site of Strabane Health Improvement Project. The new development, costing over £290,000, involved the removal of the existing portable cabin and replacing it with a state of the art modular building on the same site. The new facility is equipped with offices, counselling room, kitchen, toilet areas and a large communal meeting room and will become a hub for the local community.



This new building will become operational in June 2019 and is expected to have a significant impact on the health and wellbeing of the communities of Strabane town. It will provide Strabane Health Improvement Project with a purpose built building from which they will develop a range of new community partnership programmes that will complement existing health and wellbeing programmes already being developed within the Strabane area.

Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership Conclusion

In the 2018/19 financial year, Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership total overall spend and claimed to date was £748,466.32

This can be further broken down into Strategic Objective spend as follows:-

Community Renewal	£185,190.66
Social Renewal	£183,460.02
Economic Renewal	£98,331.75
Physical Renewal	£281,483.89

The total value of funding invested in Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal projects during the year 2018/19 was £748,466.32. The programmes/services supported by the Neighbourhood Renewal Investment Fund ranged from locally based community services through to physical renewal and neighbourhood health improvement programmes. Neighbourhood Renewal funding addressed a number of key priorities identified in the Strabane Neighbourhood Action Plan.

Community Renewal

The key actions sought under Community Renewal aim to build the area's social capital by improving the capacity of community groups to identify and meet community needs; support more people to get involved in community activity and to promote equality and good relations between people of different nationalities, race, gender, sexuality, religion and political opinion.

During 2018/19, local community groups and other stakeholders continued to plan, organize and deliver a wide range of services to residents from Strabane NRA. A total of seventeen projects were funded through the Neighbourhood Renewal Programme to deliver a range of services in support of:

- Community Development,
- Counselling/psychotherapy treatment,

- Education,
- Employability/vocational training,
- Drug & alcohol support & treatment,
- Health improvement,
- Physical renewal works,
- Welfare advice,
- Technical assistance (Neighbourhood Partnership).
- Youth Intervention

Through its action teams and working groups, The NR Partnership continued to bring together a representative mix of key community, political and statutory sectors to take the lead in helping to develop and regenerate Strabane Neighbourhood Renewal Area. From 1st April 2018 – 31st March 2019, the NR Partnership liaised/collaborated/worked with:

- National Lottery Community Fund and various project working groups to bring forward projects including Community Health Hub, Strabane Connect – a trauma informed community project, Strabane Youth Zone, Community Learning Hubs (North West Regional College +4 community centres).
- NHIP Management Group to manage delivery of 2018/19 NHIP Programme.
- Barnardo's NI to organise and deliver a series of trauma informed practice workshops for staff and volunteers working for local community organisations.
- Health Needs project steering group to put into practice asset based approaches to address underlying factors affecting health and well-being in Strabane. NR Co-ordinator continues to facilitate ongoing work to bring forward a 'one stop' health & well-being hub.
- DCSDC Sports Development Team and seven community groups (Strabane District Caring Services, Lisnafin CA; Fountain St CA; Sigersons GAA, Strabane Special Olympics, Cairde, Melmount Forum) to deliver 2018/19 'Active Citizenship through Sport' (ACTS) programme.
- DCSDC's Business & Culture Directorate, NR community groups, Strabane BID Co. and Strabane Chamber of Commerce to develop and deliver Strabane Christmas Fayre 2018.
- NR Social Economy Working Group (Strabane District Caring Services, Strabane Community Project, Strabane Health Improvement Project) to establish a jointly owned Community Maintenance social enterprise. The working group undertook a scoping study to assess the market for and viability of the joint venture social economy business.

- DCSDC, NIHE and Springhill Park Community & Residents Association to progress refurbishment/replacement of existing community centre at Springhill Park. The project is dependent upon land transfer from NIHE to DCSDC and external funding. Decision about community asset transfer pending.
- DCSDC, DfC and Lisnfain Ardnalee/Trust CDA to develop a green space Master plan for Lisnafin Park.

The NR Partnership continues to support and facilitate the Strabane local community planning process. With effect from 10th April 2019, Strabane NR Partnership will oversee delivery of the Strabane Community Growth Plan (in addition to Strabane Neighbourhood Action Plan)

Economic Renewal

In 2018/19, Strabane Neighbourhood Partnership continued to focus on fostering 'bottom up' economic development through supporting the development of social economy enterprises and helping to raise the skills levels of NRA residents to take advantage of emerging job opportunities. This was done by working alongside Enterprise North West, local Social Enterprises, Department for Communities, Derry City & Strabane District Council and by working with the North West Regional College, South West College and Strabane Unemployed Resource Centre in support of various employability programmes.

Social Renewal

The priority actions sought under Social Renewal broadly focus on improving early child development and educational attainment; reducing inequalities in health; supporting low income households and preventing crime and reducing anti-social behaviour. The Social Renewal Action Team represents a wide range of stakeholders with interests in health, education, early years, welfare advice, the arts and sports & leisure.

The Partnership's Health Sub Group continues to direct and oversee the delivery of the Neighbourhood Health Improvement Project in Strabane. In the past year, the project reached almost five hundred people through the delivery of programmes and events designed to help people become more physically active, maintain an overall healthy diet, reduce and promote positive mental health.

Based on research carried out by the Partnership, the Health sub-group is also seeking to bring forward a 'one stop' health & well-being that will provide a systematic framework for analysing, mobilising, linking and getting the most from the area's resources. The asset maps created and maintained by the Hub will offer a visual representation of community knowledge and, allied with other supporting community data, will be used to network organizations, highlight the availability or lack of health assets and to influence/support strategic planning efforts.

The various Barnardo's Surestart programmes continue to be delivered on an ongoing basis. The services delivered by Surestart range from baby massage and baby yoga classes through to speech and language and school readiness programmes. In 2018/19, 154 children from the NRA registered with Surestart.

The Education Steering Committee continued to facilitate schools based and community based initiatives that help to improve children's educational/life outcomes. Barnardo's NI, with support from the Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership, organised and delivered a series of '*Strabane Connect, Why People Need People*' workshops for schools and community groups to raise awareness of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and embed trauma informed practice in local organisations/services. The NR Learning Mentor from Holy Cross College, in partnership with Surestart and St Catherine's PS and St Mary's PS, designed and delivered a bespoke resilience programme to the parents of children attending nursery school.

The PSNI Neighbourhood Policing Team and community representatives continue to build working relationships with NRA residents to identify and tackle local priorities;

Physical Renewal

The Physical Renewal Action Team worked on the following priority actions during 2018/19:

Improvements to Estates

- Liaise with Department for Infrastructure Roads and DfC to implement environmental improvements in Lisnafin Park, Bridge St and 'Head of the Town' areas.

Sport, Leisure and Recreation Facilities

- Assist Strabane Health Improvement Project to bring forward a new community health building.
- Assist Fountain St Community Development Association and Derry City & Strabane District Council with the regeneration of a derelict site at Fountain St Community Centre



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
