

Our PCSPs are award winning!

Our PCSPs have been cleaning up at the awards ceremonies recently. No Oscars yet but some of the campaigns they have been running show the innovation behind many of the projects being rolled out. The first ever Road Safety Awards has recognised the work of PCSPs in promoting road safety across communities.

Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon took second place for its Young Passengers and Drivers (YPAD) project which has already been rolled out to over 1500 young people. The multi-agency partnership project raises awareness of the potential dangers for drivers and passengers between 16-18. The PCSP uses a film written and filmed by local young people to illustrate the consequences of behaviour in cars and the project template is being made available to other PCSP to deliver in their area.

It comes as no surprise that the **Roadsafe Roadshow** won joint first for the best public sector project. As our regular readers know, the Roadshow is delivered by the PSNI in partnership with the Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service and the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service. The Roadshow spells out the real life consequences of collisions on the road and illustrates quite graphically the roles of the emergency services when dealing with crashes. The Roadshow has evolved how information is presented since it first began in 2001 and it's estimated that it has been seen by around 8,000 young people each year since.

PCSPs across the country have brought the Roadshow to their areas and **Belfast PCSP** were highly commended at the awards for the Roadshow they hosted in the grounds of the City Hall.

Newry, Mourne and Down with the kids

Newry, Mourne and Down PCSP have been out engaging with schools in the area in partnership with local policing teams.

Friday Night Activity

The Friday Night Activity Hub has kicked off in Downpatrick Sports Centre with young people from the Ballymote area getting the chance to have a go at all sorts of free activities.

Sponsored by Newry, Mourne and Down PCSP in conjunction with the Flying Horse Forum and County Down Rural Community Network, the initiative aims to reduce the level of anti-social behaviour in the area.

This is a pilot which will run until the end of January and in the first week about 30 young locals got to try out bubble football, competing against the local policing team. Other options will include beauty tips and DJ sessions or even just kicking about listening to music or playing the X Box.

Speaking about the benefit of this kind of initiative, PCSP Chair Cllr Mickey Larkin, said: **"This is a great initiative for the young people within the Ballymote Community. Rather than hanging around the streets on Friday Nights they now have somewhere safe to go and have fun at the same time. It is great to see the Community and Statutory Bodies come together to provide all these activities for the young."**

Teenage Kickz

Mid and East Antrim PCSP have been funding a football coaching programme designed to improve life skills for young people in the area.

The programme encourages young people deemed to be at risk to get qualifications in coaching. After a game, the Local Policing Team talk through the dangers and consequences of drugs.

PCSP Chair Ald Gregg McKeen said: "I am extremely heartened by the level of enthusiasm evidenced by these young people who turn out to participate in snow, hail, rain, regardless. I am confident that this project will ultimately reach out to a much wider circle than the immediate beneficiaries."


Make it stop

Preventing business crime

The PSNI and PCSPs have been working together to help local businesses protect themselves against retail crime. Business owners are being armed with a crime prevention toolkit which includes a risk assessment they can carry out themselves and a crime reduction guide. It also includes details on cybercrime and how to make premises secure.

Another element of the support given to businesses is the Safe Shop Scheme which share simple and practical information such as what to watch out for with shoplifters and tips for staff on how to deal with difficult situations.

Supporting a Civic Forum in Derry and Strabane

Derry and Strabane PCSP have given their support to the new Civic Forum for the area. It will replace a number of existing forums and address issues relating to drugs, alcohol, homelessness and mental health all of which have links with policing and community safety.

Speaking about the money, Justice Minister David Ford said: **“This money, which has been taken out of the hands of criminals and returned to the community will make a real difference in supporting those who want to do good for the community instead of inflicting harm and fear.”**
