Raising Awareness about Alcohol Misuse

'Last Orders'

Causeway Coast & Glens PCSP has funded the delivery of 'Last Orders' in post primary schools across the council area. This hard-hitting drama and programme of facilitated workshops targets year 10 pupils and explores the themes of alcohol, anti-social behaviour and the consequences and impact of risk-taking behaviours.

This educational and preventative programme aims to help pupils explore consequences and legalities as well as looking at the physical, mental and emotional impacts of such behaviours.

Commenting on the project, PCSP Chair Cllr James McCorkell said: "The response from schools across the council area has been an overwhelming willingness to engage in this initiative which allows students to explore important issues in an innovative way within the school setting."

Developed by a team of doctors, NSPCC professionals and teachers, 'Last Orders' is a professional and

specialist theatre company production telling the story of three teenagers embarking on an alcohol fuelled night out and exploring the disastrous consequences.

Based on true events, the play is written in a hard-hitting yet humorous style. Following the performance, an interactive workshop involving cast-in character improvisation allows students to explore the themes of anti-social behaviour, illegal purchase, cyber safety and attitudes to risk.

Cllr McCorkell continued: "Anti-Social behaviour and alcohol misuse are key priorities for the PCSP and projects such as this are vital to engage young people in these issues and enable them to consider consequence and risk."

Road Traffic Collision Reconstruction

Fifty pupils from St Joseph's College, Coalisland took part in an Emergency Services Road Traffic Collision Reconstruction organised by Mid Ulster PCSP and the PSNI in an effort to raise awareness of road safety and reduce the numbers of people killed and seriously injured on the road.

The reconstruction was a realistic portrayal in real time of what happens immediately after a collision. From the arrival of the first police car, to the ambulance personnel treating the casualty, fire service cutting the roof off the vehicle to release the trapped and fatally injured passenger, and the final removal of the deceased from the scene by a local undertaker.

The challenge facing us all is to reduce road traffic collisions and the risk of injury. An interactive scenario was set up on each of these issues for the pupils.

At the end of each event the children were asked to write comments about what they thought of the Bee Safe initiative and all comments were very positive.

Robert Smith, PCSP Chair said: "We are committed to increasing awareness of the dangers of social networking and reducing internet abuse within the Borough and will continue to implement initiatives like this. It was heartening to see so many schools get involved and to see the understanding that young people have regarding online issues."

From Kitchen to Killer

Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon PCSP and the PSNI are implementing a Borough-wide campaign to raise awareness about how a kitchen knife can also be a lethal weapon with fatal consequences.

The hard-hitting and graphic campaign shows a kitchen knife on the floor surrounded by blood to depict the devastating impact of how a kitchen knife can mean life – either life imprisonment for the perpetrator or taking away the life of the victim.

This image will be displayed on buses throughout the Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon area and on Social Media, to send the message to as many people as possible.

While knife crime is relatively low within the Borough there have been a small number of fatal incidents

which have had a devastating impact on families and friends. Most of these murders have been committed with household knives and have involved alcohol consumption.

“This campaign is very hard hitting and we know that it will have a ‘shock factor’, when people see it” commented Ald Robert Smith, PCSP Chair. “However, it is a message that we need to get out into the community and a message that needs to be heard to try and help prevent any further tragic incidents that could ruin lives.”

Research on ‘Views on Alcohol and Drug Related issues’ published

The Department of Justice (DOJ) recently published research detailing what people’s views are on Alcohol and Drug Related issues.

Forming part of the September 2015 Northern Ireland Omnibus Survey key findings show that 36.6% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed with the statement ‘I am concerned about alcohol related issues in my local area’. This compares to 43.9% of respondents who disagreed or strongly disagreed with the statement. Just over one third of respondents (35.5%) agreed or strongly agreed with the statement ‘I am concerned about drug related issues in my local area’ compared with 44.2% who disagreed or strongly disagreed.

Taking everything into account, 52.7% of respondents expressed some, a lot, or total confidence that enough is being done to tackle alcohol and/or drug related issues in Northern Ireland and expressed higher levels of confidence in the PSNI’s work to tackle alcohol and/or drug related issues across Northern Ireland than that of any other organisation, with 69.5% of respondents having either some, a lot or total confidence.

Older people's safety to the fore

Call blocking initiative launched

Justice Minister David Ford recently launched a scam call blocking initiative which aims to protect older vulnerable people from falling victim to phone scammers.

Jointly funded by the Department of Justice (DoJ), the PSNI and the Policing Board, this initiative will build on the work that has been undertaken by Trading Standards in this area.

Derry and Strabane PCSP has introduced the new scheme locally and is one of five PCSPs across Northern Ireland delivering the initiative.

David Ford said: **"We have all seen stories in the media recently of the older people deprived of their hard-earned life savings through elaborate scams and of vulnerable individuals exploited by unscrupulous cold callers."**

This new initiative will see those who have been identified

as the most vulnerable having a call blocking device installed in their homes which will substantially reduce the levels of nuisance calls."

Speaking about the initiative Policing Board Chair Anne Connolly said: **"The Board is well aware that older people, particular those living on their own, can be more vulnerable to phone scammers. We are very pleased to offer support for this initiative which will help to protect older people from being scammed and hopefully contribute to them feeling safer in their own home."**

PSNI Inspector Temra Neill, Policing with the Community, said: **"We are pleased to be part of the scam call blocking initiative which will provide an extra layer of protection and reassurance for the more vulnerable members of our communities."**

The DoJ has funded Mid and East Antrim Agewell Partnership (MEAAP) to provide training and support to PCSPs and their local networks in rolling out this initiative, based on their experience of taking forward a similar project.


