Getting the tools to succed

orth Belfast-based Women's TEC is helping women gain employment in job

sectors where females are underrepresented through their #NotJustForBoys Promoting Opportunities Programme. The programme hopes to challenge misconceptions and encourage young women to consider opportunities in sectors that offer

Statistics show that girls often opt for traditionally-viewed female career paths such as hairdressing, beauty or childcare. Salaries linked to these professions are generally lower, employment less secure, and progression opportunities limited. Compare this to traditional male professions such as construction or engineering where salaries are higher and there are more opportunities for career

flexibility and wider career choices.

Through #NotJustForBoys, young women aged 13-24 will have the opportunity to learn a range of

progression.

skills such as electrics, plumbing, carpentry, tiling, furniture making, and horticulture.

The innovative programme provides participants with the experience and confidence to pursue a trade

qualification or kick start their career in the construction industry. *The #NotJustForBoys programme is run in collaboration with the Housing Executive, Women's Tec, Gilbert-Ash, the

Construction Industry Training Board NI, JP Corry and The Urban Villages Initiative.

Destined is funded by the Big Lottery Fund, the Western Trust, Urban Villages, Derry City and Strabane District Council, the Department for Communities, Ulster Garden Villages and the Housing Executive.

n September we took a whistlestop tour of the newly opened Destined flagship facility. The facility, based at the Foyle Valley Railway Museum site in Derry-Londonderry, provides services to people with learning disabilities at all stages of their lives.

The new centre, made possible thanks to a range of funders including the Housing Executive, gives people with learning disabilities a place to socialise, learn skills, and gain work experience.

When we arrived we were greeted by the lovely Martha, a member of Destined, who took us around the centre's state of the art crèche, café and car wash.

Next stop was the newly refurbished railway museum where we learned about the different types of trains, including the iconic Meenglass steam train that once operated out of the city.

Martha, who is being trained to become a tour guide, told us why she loves being part of Destined,

"It gets me up in the morning! I've made lots of friends and get to take part in things like the Santa's Grotto. We do it every Christmas and it's my favourite!

I also really enjoy working as a tour guide and telling people all about the trains."



e visited Omagh Men's Shed to find out how the initiative is helping local men improve their health and wellbeing, utilise their skills, and make a difference in their community.

Since it was established in 2015, Omagh Men's Shed has given its members a safe space to connect, feel valued, and work on something meaningful at their own pace.

Over the years the group have used Housing Executive funding to set up a furniture workshop and bric-a-brac store, create a community garden, hold IT training sessions, and run a range of projects that promote positive mental health.

With the majority of members being retired tradesmen, the Men's Shed enables them to use their

wealth of experience and skills to do things that they enjoy.

Ernie Coburn, Omagh Men's Shed Committee Member, tells us how the initiative has had a positive impact on the wellbeing of its members,

"Spending the day in our polytunnel or furniture workshop helps men keep active, socialise with one another and feel part of a community. There's no pressure, they can even just come in for a chat and cup of tea if that's all they want.

Men are often reluctant to talk about their emotions or ask for help and this is why the Men's Shed is so important. It has become a lifeline for many of our members especially those who are recovering from a serious illness or are struggling with their mental health."

The island has the seal of approval...

Rathlin is home to over 530 marine species and is designated as a Special Area of Conservation.

If you're visiting keep an eye out for seals, dolphins, basking sharks and rare sea birds.

he beautiful and historic island of Rathlin, located six miles from the coastal town of Ballycastle, has a population of 155 people and is home to incredible wildlife. In November we got a taste of island life when we went on a day trip to chat to local people about why they love living in one of the most remote places in Northern Ireland.

The only way to get to the island is by ferry and when we arrived - still in awe that a pod of dolphins had joined us on our journey - we got a warm welcome from the islanders. This sense of hospitality is just one of the reasons why we chose Rathlin as the winner of our 'Rural Community Spirit' award in the small village category. We were delighted to hear that the local people are planning on using the £1,000 prize money to support projects that bring the islanders together.

The close-knit community are also very welcoming to newcomers and were thrilled when Apex Housing Association built 10 new homes

there following a Rural Housing Need Test we carried out on the island.

After exploring the rugged landscape, chatting to the friendly locals and learning more about Rathlin's history, we popped into the island's shop for a coffee before heading back on the ferry. Aoife, the manager there, told us why she loves island life.


"I'll never forget how eight years ago when I had just given birth to my son and was bringing him home for the first time, everyone came down to the harbour with balloons and banners to welcome him to the island.

There's a real sense of community here and we make sure that we celebrate everyone's milestones."

We also fund a floating support service on the island. This includes 'The Tuesday Club' which brings older residents together to socialise, have fun and improve their wellbeing.

The Futures Project, run in partnership with the Housing Executive, Start 360 and Belfast Met, is an exciting 6 month youth development programme empowering young people aged 16-24 to learn new skills, gain a qualification, and take charge of their life.

With the latest cohort starting in January, Jamie explains how the project can help young people find their future,

"Throughout the programme every young person will get tailored support that focuses on improving their health and wellbeing, getting them ready for the world of work, and discovering what they want to achieve in life.

I have seen how the programme has helped young people find their voice, step outside their comfort zone to try new things, and make lifelong friends.

So what are you waiting for?! Join the Futures Project and kick start the New Year by investing in you."

Catherine, 23, said, 'I feel I've come on in leaps and bounds since joining Futures! It's been an amazing experience right down to the tearful end. Making lifelong friendships, new found confidence, and better awareness when it comes to others and my own mental health. My eyes have been opened to new perspectives of the community as well as an understanding of people's views and opinions.'

Katie, 21, says, 'I was scared and didn't know my place in society or what to do with my life. Now I have a solid idea of my place in the world, a better understanding of the world and the issues that young people face.'

Thomas, 20, says, 'I came to Futures as I was jobless, out of education, and aimless in my life. I had been struggling with mental health issues and had a lot of mental blocks. Since joining in early October, I have developed a lot of confidence and have figured out my career path and want to be a youth worker! This course essentially changed my outlook, my ideas and basically my life.'



Eid Festival comes to Belfast

s part of our Community Cohesion programme, we provide funding and support to promote good relations between people of different backgrounds in communities across Northern Ireland.

We were delighted Belfast Islamic Centre were able to use this funding to bring the first ever Eid Festival to the city in August 2019.

Over 2,000 people came together in Botanic Gardens to mark the end of Eid al-Adha, an important event in the Muslim calendar celebrating the Prophet Ibrahim, and to learn more about different cultures.

The festival, which sold out in 72 hours, had something for everyone including craft stalls, sensory tents, Henna tattoo artists, and the opportunity to try food from all around the world.

Organiser Zoreena Ahmend, from North Belfast, explained why the Belfast Islamic Centre wanted to hold the event,

"In the Muslim community we have a saying; 'How we gather is how we live' and Eid Festival is about coming together to share food and enjoy each other's company.

We are absolutely delighted that so many people came along to sample the best of Islamic culture in the heart of the city of Belfast."

Armoy children graduate Miniversity

n May primary school children in Armoy celebrated completing the Miniversity careers programme, the UK and Ireland's only afterschool Computer Club with a careers education theme, at a graduation ceremony in the village.

The Miniversity Causeway Coast project, funded through our Community Cohesion programme, brought pupils from Armoy Primary School and St Olcan's Primary school together to pick up new ICT skills while learning about a range of different careers.

Over 200 children took part in interactive lessons that focused on computer coding, using a range of Microsoft programmes, and being safe online. Each week they also looked at the skills required to work in areas such as game development, social media influencing, and paediatrics.

On completion of the 10 week programme the pupils were presented with certificates and showcased their work to their families at the graduation ceremony in Armoy Primary School.



EMMA'S UNIVERSAL CREDIT

MAKING A UNIVERSAL CREDIT CLAIM IN SEVEN STEPS

Universal Credit is a payment for people aged 18 to State Pension age, on a low income or out of work. It includes support for the cost of housing, children and childcare, and financial support for people with disabilities, carers and people too ill to work. If your circumstances change you may move to Universal Credit at that time and your existing benefits will stop. It is expected that those affected will move to Universal

Something to remember...

Universal Credit housing costs only cover your rent payments. You need to complete a Rate Rebate application for your rates. Visit nidirect.gov.uk for more info.

Making a claim as a couple

If you're a couple living together you **BOTH** must make a claim. Your partner's income and savings will be taken into account even if they are not eligible for Universal Credit.

DON'T DELAY, SUBMIT YOUR CLAIM AS SOON AS YOU CAN

Not sure? Don't open the door.



ou should never feel embarrassed about refusing to let someone into your home. Only let someone in when you're absolutely sure that they're genuine and you want them in your home.

Before you go to open your front door, make sure the back door is shut and locked. Not sure? Don't open the door.

To keep your home safe and compliant, our staff and contractors may occasionally need access to your home.

If you are in any doubt about the identity of a staff member or contractor, always ask for valid identification.

A genuine caller won't have a problem with you taking these precautions and won't mind following your request.

If valid identification is not shown, do not grant access.

To check if contractors or Housing Executive staff are due to visit your property, for any reason, call us on 03448 920 901.

Don't fall prey to a scam

cams are getting more sophisticated and difficult to spot, it's important to know what to look for.

About scams

Scamming is not uncommon in Northern Ireland. Scams target people of all ages, backgrounds and income levels. Older, vulnerable people are particularly susceptible as well as those who are very trusting and easily persuaded to take a risk. A third of scam victims fall for a second scam within 12 months.

Scams can cause significant financial consequences, as well as lost confidence.

Common scams

The nature and complexity of scams is continuously changing and getting more sophisticated with scammers always looking for new ways to get ahead.

Some scams overlap, with half of all scams starting with a phone call. The most common methods and types of scam are:

- phone scams and cold calls
- online scams
- scams by post
- doorstep fraud



How to protect yourself from

There are a few general tips to protect yourself from becoming a victim of a scam.

- Never give out personal information.
- Always check the credentials of any company or person you're unsure about.
- Don't make any advanced payments until you are sure the company or person you're dealing with is legitimate.
- If you're unsure about a financial services company, check the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) register of regulated companies. If they're not on it, don't have anything to do with them.
- Avoid being added to mailing lists which scammers sometimes get hold of.

Keeping you up to date on Welfare Reform

here are measures in place for people in Northern Ireland to reduce the impact of welfare changes. These are known as Welfare Supplementary Payments and are sometimes referred to as 'mitigations'. These are due to end on 31 March 2020. The Department for Communities have advised that they are exploring a number of options for the continuation of these payments to support people who may lose out under welfare changes. If there are any changes to these payments we will contact you to offer support and guidance.

HomeSwapper is a free online service to look for homes that are available to exchange. The service is useful for tenants who:

- want a larger or smaller
- want to move to a different
- want a more suitable home and don't want to wait for a long time on the transfer list

Follow these 5 tips to prevent a fire in your home:

- 1. Check your smoke detector regularly
- 2. Make sure you don't leave burning candles unattended
- 3. Take care to not overload electrical sockets
- 4. Don't leave cooking unattended

Tower Block Update

Following the consultation exercise in 2018/19 on our draft plan, a final Tower Blocks Action Plan was approved by the Housing Executive Board in March 2019.

The plan's proposals include a mixture of redevelopment, demolition, investment and sale. All of our residents in the blocks have been written to, informing them of the Action Plan's proposal for their

The Action Plan was referred to the Department for Communities and was endorsed in August 2019.

The Department has asked the Housing Executive to bring forward individual business cases for approval, setting out detailed proposals for each block or group of blocks.

We intend to carry these out over the next 12 months which will involve resident consultation on our proposals.





Supported through Community Cohesion, Ballynafeigh Cultural Group delivered a cross community project which focused on historical links between the Northern Irish and Polish communities, focusing on the role of the Polish Armed Forces in the Second World War.

Young people from West Belfast were able to gain an OCN qualification in photography. The project involved a partnership between the Falls Women's Centre and Cara Friend. Sixteen young people took part in the project and were able to work on exploring different topics which they felt strongly about, such as gender and marriage equality. They were also able to increase confidence in themselves by communicating with one another about issues that they may not have opened up about before.

A couple who lost their teenage daughter to cancer started a social enterprise café in her memory in the Brandywell area of Derry-Londonderry with funding from the Housing Executive. After their daughter Alexandra, better known as Yaya, sadly passed away at the age of 16, Andre and Karen Johnston set up 'Yaya's Shack' as a way to remember

The Housing Executive, in partnership with Howard Street Primary School, worked with artist Fiona Stewart to form the Bohemian Tree Design. She worked with Year 5 pupils from Howard Primary School to transform a piece of wall on the site of the former linen mill café, now known as Apple Jacks. The project was aimed at re-imaging a very unsightly wall near the school and replacing it with a more positive and educational image that shows the history of the Linen Mill industry in Moygashel.



How we did in **2018/19**



The Community Intercultural Programme delivered a 5 day intercultural summer scheme in Portadown. The event attracted 750 young people from 12 different cultural backgrounds and was a great opportunity for the young people to build relations with other young people from a different ethnicity or religion.

Strathroy Community Association held a celebration event in May for young people who had taken part in a community safety programme funded by the Housing Executive. Over 24 weeks young people and local residents attended engagement sessions that highlighted the effects of anti-social behaviour on their community and workshops delivered by Breakthru, a local drugs and alcohol awareness charity, which reinforced the dangers of substance misuse.



We all lead really busy lives and it's not always convenient to pop into your local Housing Executive office when you need advice or help. This is why we have made it easy for you to contact us from your home or when you're on the go...



To get advice on managing your rent payments and making a budget contact your Patch Manager by ringing our General Enquiries line.

I love my home, I just need a few adjustments like a grab rail placed outside my front door to help me to do things independently.

We are able to carry out minor adaptations to your home like installing grab rails, relocating sockets and moving clothes rails without an Occupational Therapist referral. To speak to a Maintenance Officer about getting your home adapted ring our Repair line.

I'm having problems with my neighbour and don't feel comfortable talking to them about it.
